Fundamental Concepts of Christianity

Salvation is the saving of your Spiritual life. Having salvation means you will go to heaven and have eternal life and live with God forever. Salvation is only obtained through Jesus. You need to accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior to go to heaven. (All of chapter three in the Gospel of John states the fact that whoever believes in Jesus goes to heaven.)

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." *John 3:16*

"He who believes in the Son has everlasting life and he who does not believe in the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." *John 3:36*

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." John 14:6

Jesus says, "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me has eternal life." *John* 6:47

[Jesus] "I am the door. If anyone enters by Me, he will be saved." John 10:9

Whoever denies the Son does not have the Father either; he who acknowledges the Son has the Father also. *1 John 2:23*

Faith in Jesus is all you need to have your soul live eternally with God - the ultimate save.

But what does it say, "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart." (That is, the word of faith that we preach): That if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the Scriptures says, "Whoever believes on Him will not be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord over all is rich to all who call upon Him. For "whoever calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved." *Romans 10: 8-13*

As you can see, Salvation is all about Jesus.

And it shall come to pass that whoever calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved.

Acts 2:21

Jesus' name means "LORD is Salvation."

Jesus is the Son of God, the Christ, the Messiah. The Samaritan woman at the well meets the Messiah.

The woman said to Him, "I know that Messiah is coming (who is called Christ). When He comes, He will tell us all things." Jesus said to her, "I who speak to you am He." *John 4:25-26*

Simon Peter answered and said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." *Matthew 16:16*

Jesus is God. Jesus fulfilled all the requirements (more than 300 conditions) of the Messiah spoken about in the Bible for thousands of years prior to His first coming.

Christ came, who is over all the eternally blessed God. Amen. Romans 9:5

He was clothed with a robe dipped in blood, and His name is called The Word of God. *Revelation 19:13* (The <u>Word</u> is one of the title names of <u>Jesus</u>)

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made. *John 1:13*

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth. *John 1:14*

For in Him [Jesus] dwells all the fullness of the Godhead bodily. Colossians 2:9

Looking for the blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed.

Titus 2:13-14

God was manifested in the flesh,
Justified in the Spirit,
Seen by angels,
Preached among the Gentiles,
Believed on in the world,
Received up in glory. 1 Timothy 3:16

The Trinity is really one God. Three Persons make up one God.

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1 God the Father
+
1 God the Son
+
1 God the Holy Spirit
= 1 God
1+1+1=1
3=1
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Each Person is a complete separate divine Being. All Three Persons are equal in Their importance and in Their state of Divineness and together They make up one God.

This is He who came by water and blood - Jesus Christ; not only by water, but by water and blood. And it is the Spirit who bears witness, because the Spirit is truth. For there are three that bear witness in heaven: the Father, the Word, and the Holy Spirit; and these Three are one.

1 John 5:6-7 (The Word is Jesus)

The concept of the Trinity is beyond human understanding. It is given to us by the revelation of God.

The water example - Three separate forms of water, but they are all water.

Water exists in liquid form. Water exists in ice (solid) form. Water exists in vapor (gas) form.

Three separate forms of God, but together they make up one God.

God the Father
God the Son - Jesus
God the Holy Spirit - the Spirit form of God

God took the form of a Man (Jesus) to teach us about Himself and to provide the Way for the redemption of mankind - how we can be forgiven for our sins.

Redemption - the human condition of sin. We are all sinners and we continue to sin throughout our lives.

What then? Are we better than they? Not at all. For we have previously charged both Jews and Greeks, that they are all under sin. As it is written, "There is none righteous, no, not one."

Romans 3:9-10

For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. *Romans 3:23-24*

Not one person is good enough to be in heaven, but God has given us the <u>free gift</u> of eternal life through His grace. He gives us something we don't deserve, but gives it to us anyway because of His infinite love for us.

A man is justified by faith apart from deeds of the law. Romans 3:28

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. *Ephesians 2:8-9*

The entire Bible is about Jesus. He is on every page. Jesus is God's plan for the redemption of man.

Redemption - To pay the required price to secure the release of a convicted criminal (us).

Redeemer - The person making the payment (Jesus).

We are all sinners. Our sins have to be paid for in full in order for us to go to heaven. Jesus paid for our sins; in fact He died for our sins. Heaven is such a beautiful and wonderful place,

"eyes have not seen and ears have not heard, hearts have not understood the glory that awaits us in heaven." 1 Corinthians 2:9

We can not just show up in heaven without our sins being paid for. Jesus paid for our sins - all of our sins - past, present and future sins. Jesus died for all of mankind's sin. Jesus' payment was in fact His death on the Cross (the ultimate payment). We can not pay for our sins ourselves because we are innately sinful and continue to sin up to the moment we die. Our sins must be paid for. Jesus did this for us so that we can have peace (reconciliation) with God the Father.

And she will bring forth a Son and you shall call His name JESUS, for He will save His people from their sins. *Matthew 1:21*

In Him we have <u>redemption</u> through His blood, the <u>forgiveness of sins</u>. *Ephesians 1:7*

When we accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior, our sins are forgiven and God the Father no longer sees our sins. They are covered by the blood of Jesus. We are made white and pure by Jesus' death on the cross.

"Their sins and their lawless deeds I will remember no more." Hebrews 10:17

The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" *John 1:29*

But this Man [Jesus], after He had offered one sacrifice for sins forever, sat down at the right hand of God. *Hebrews 10:12*

For Christ also suffered once for sins, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God.

1 Peter 3:18

The Crucifixion - Jesus died on the cross to pay for our sins. His last words on the cross were, "tetelestai." This is Greek for "paid in full." To pay the debt of man's sin in full - completely. In the English translation, Jesus says, "It is finished! (tetelestai)" - a debt that is finished. Mankind's debt (sins) are finally paid in full.

Tetelestai - from teleo in Greek: to end, i.e. complete, execute, conclude, discharge (a debt), accomplish, make an end, expire, fill up, finish, pay. Paid in full. [Strong's Concordance]

An example that would help explain this is during Jesus' time, when a man was released from prison after serving his punishment for his crimes, he was given a release paper (his debt to society form) and it was stamped "tetelestai" (paid in full). The man had paid in full for his crimes. His prison sentence was served. Jesus paid our debt for all our sins in full.

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom [payment] for many. *Mark* 10:45

Jesus died on the cross to pay the penalty for the sin of the world. The Crucifixion paid for all of mankind's sins. However, to go to heaven, you <u>must</u> accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior and then, and <u>only then</u> are your sins forgiven and you become a child of God. This is the new covenant of the New Testament.

Jesus said, "For this is My blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." *Matthew 26:28*

Remission of sins means to release from the penalty of sins or simply the forgiveness of sins.

But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe in His name. *John 1:12*

For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. Galatians 3:26

You + Jesus = Forgiveness of Sins = Heaven

When you accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior, your sins are forgiven and you become a child of God.

You go to heaven. If you don't accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior, your sins are not forgiven and you

are a condemned sinner that receives punishment on Judgment Day. You go to hell and afterwards to Gehenna, the lake of fire, for eternity.

God wants you to go to heaven, but He will not force you. God gave you the gift of free will to choose Jesus or not to choose Jesus. Remember, John 14:6 in which Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." It is your choice where your soul lives eternally - either with God or without God, and believe me you want to be with God.

The Resurrection - Jesus died and was raised from the dead. His guarantee to us that this will also happen to believers.

Jesus says, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live. And whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die." *John 11:25*

When we die we are suddenly absent from the body and present with the Lord. We are confident, yes, well pleased rather to be absent from the body and to be present with the Lord.

Corinthians 5:8

The Resurrection demonstrates Jesus' Deity (Jesus is God) and proves that Jesus is God because only God Himself can raise Himself from the dead. When the disciple Thomas saw Jesus in His resurrected state Thomas said in John 20:28, "My Lord and my God."

"Therefore My Father loves Me, because I lay down My life that I may take it again. No one takes it from Me, but I lay it down of Myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again. This command I have received from My Father." *John 10:17-18*

Jesus said that only He has the power to lay His life down (die) and then to take it up again (resurrect Himself from the dead).

In Matthew, Jesus said He would raise Himself in three days.

Jesus answered and said unto them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up."

John 2.19

Jesus appeared to His disciples three days after His death in His resurrected body. Jesus' first appearance was in the upper room to ten of His disciples. Thomas was not there. Thomas did not believe that Jesus appeared to them. Eight days later Jesus appears again to His disciples - this time Thomas is there.

Jesus said to him, "Thomas, because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." *John 20:29*

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These are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name. *John 20:31*

The Resurrection authenticates and validates who Jesus is and Christianity itself. Jesus ministered on earth for 40 more days after the Resurrection; then He ascended into heaven (the Ascension).

He also presented Himself alive [the Resurrection] after His suffering [the Crucifixion] by many infallible proofs, being seen by them during forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God. *Acts* 1:3

Now when He had spoken these things, while they watched, He was taken up, and a cloud received Him out of their sight [the Ascension]. *Acts* 1:9

During the 40 days Jesus hand picked hundreds of witnesses to His resurrected physical state - which is recorded in history. (1 Corinthians 15:3-8)

He did this because He wanted to prove to people that Christianity is real and the only true belief system. No other religion has proof like this. No other religion has a man claim to be the Son of God and one of the forms of God Himself, then die and be raised from the dead with witnesses.

Jesus' miracles of resurrecting Jairus' daughter, the widow of Nain's son and Lazarus who had been dead for four days really got people's attention. Then when Jesus raised Himself from the dead after three days, it confirmed His Deity and Christianity itself.

The Resurrection took a group of scared frightened disciples just after the Crucifixion and turned them into a powerful motivated pumped up nucleus that initiated the church (believers in Christ).

The Resurrection proves that Jesus is who He says He is—the Son of God and the bodily form of God Himself.

The New Birth— the transformation of the believer.

Jesus answered and said to him, "Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born again he cannot see the kingdom of God." *John 3:3*

Three transformations occur when you accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior.

- (1) Instantaneously, you are given the free gift of eternal life. You are <u>born</u> into <u>eternal life</u> right then at that moment of commitment to Jesus. We are born first in the body then born second into eternal spiritual life the second birth. We are born twice, die once, then we are resurrected and live eternally with God.
- (2) We are immediately given a new clean spirit. Remember there is a trinity within ourselves heart (spirit), body (muscles and brain), and soul.
- (3) The Holy Spirit indwells us. The Third Person of God indwells (lives inside us) the believer immediately at the moment of acceptance of Jesus in our hearts, and He, the Holy Spirit never leaves us.

"And I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever - the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him for He dwells with you and will be in you." *John* 14: 16-17

Faith— belief in Jesus. Faith has many dimensions; the most important is love.

Jesus wants you to love Him, to have a personal relationship with Him, and to want Him and need Him in your life. For example, all a father really wants from his son or daughter is for his child to love him. He doesn't care if they are sinners. All Jesus wants is for you to love Him, to accept Him in your heart, to give your heart to Him, and to give your life over to Him.

Put Jesus in charge of your life. Commit your heart to Jesus. Commit yourself to Jesus today and you will live with Him in heaven forever.

This commitment can be done in the privacy of your own will. You can do it right now today. If you are ready and sincere, just say this prayer:

"I accept You Jesus as my Lord and Savior. I want You in my life. I need You in my life. I believe You are the Son of God, the Christ, the Messiah. I believe You paid and died for my sins. I believe You were raised from the dead. I believe in God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. Jesus, I know I am a sinner. I'm sorry I am a sinner. I turn to You Jesus with all my heart. Please forgive all my sins. I believe You are my Savior and I will live in heaven with you forever. All this I confess with my mouth and believe in my heart. Thank You Jesus. I love You Jesus. Amen."

The Ten Dimensions of Faith

Faith is what we believe. It is the relationship we have with God through Jesus because of Jesus' death, Crucifixion and Resurrection.

First to understand faith you need to understand God's love for you - Agape love. This love is 100% unconditional. It is a sacrificial infinite love that God has for us.

Imagine the best father - child relationship you can think of - father to son or father to daughter. The father loves the child 100% unconditionally. Remember when you become a Christian, you become a child of God.

Behold what manner of love the Father has bestowed on us, that we should be called children of God! Therefore the world does not know us, because it did not know Him.

1 John

3:1

But as many as received Him [Jesus], to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe in His name. *John 1:12*

For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. *John 3:16-17*

The original Greek translation says in John 3:16 that whoever "pisteuo" in Him... Pisteuo is Greek for the word faitheth - to have faith in. The exact translation is that whoever Faitheth in Jesus should not perish but have everlasting life. The word faitheth got dropped out of middle English hundreds of years ago and became replaced by believeth.

The bottom line is whoever faitheth in Jesus has salvation. Believeth = Faitheth = To have faith in. Whoever has faith goes to heaven.

1) **Love**— The most important dimension of faith is love. All Jesus wants is for you to love Him and to have a personal relationship with Him

We love Him because He first loved us. 1 John 4:19

All a father really wants from his child is for that child to love him. He doesn't care if the child is a sinner or makes mistakes. All the father wants is for the child to do things with him, to talk to him, and to be involved in his life.

Jesus wants this relationship with us. Jesus wants to "know" us. We as Christians are, in fact, considered the bride of Christ. The believers in Christ are the true church, not a building or denomination.

The relationship that Christ has with us is as a husband has with a bride. It is that close of a relationship.

All Jesus wants is for the believer to love Him, and love is a decision of the heart. God gave us free will as a gift; we are not robots. Jesus can not make a human love Him. It is our decision to have a personal relationship with Him or not. It is the most important decision you will ever make in your life.

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus is talking to His disciples. Then one of the disciples asks Him:

"Lord, are there few who are saved?" And He said to them, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I say to you, will seek to enter and will not be able. When once the Master of the house has risen up and shut the door, and you begin to stand outside and knock at the door, saying, 'Lord, Lord, open for us,' and He will answer and say to you, 'I do not know you, where you are from,' then you will begin to say, 'We ate and drank in Your presence, and You taught in our streets.' But He will say, 'I tell you I do not know you, where you are from. Depart from Me.' " Luke 13:23-27

The word "know" in the original Greek has the meaning as a husband "knows" his bride. It is that close a relationship. Greek is a much more exact language than English. The New Testament was written in Greek by the disciples of Jesus and later translated into English.

Here, Jesus is describing the door to heaven. Only those people who Jesus knows are in heaven. My question to any person is, "Does Jesus <u>know</u> you?" I hope the answer is yes. In your lifetime, hopefully today, make sure Jesus knows you. Have a personal relationship with Him; want Him in your life and need Him in your life.

My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand. *John* 10:27-28

Jesus Christ, whom having not seen you love. Though now you do not see Him, yet believing, you rejoice with joy inexpressible and full of glory, receiving the end of your faith - the salvation of your souls. 1 Peter 1:7-9

God is love. 1 John 4:16

"'You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind,' and 'your neighbor as yourself'" *Luke 10:27*

2) **Commitment**— is extremely important. When you become a Christian you make a commitment to Christ. In love you commit your heart to someone. In Christianity, you commit your heart to Christ and give your heart over to Christ. As a Christian and a believer, your life is now committed to Christ.

Again, in the most perfect father - child relationship, the child is committed to the father and the father is committed to the child 100% unconditionally.

3) Acceptance— When you become a Christian, you accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior.

But what does it say? "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith which we preach): that if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the Scripture says, "Whoever believes on Him will not be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord over all is rich to all who call upon Him. For "whoever calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved." Romans 10:8-13

You need to accept Jesus into your heart. James, the brother of Jesus, also talks about acceptance. Our relationship with Christ is more than just belief Even demons and Satan believe that Jesus is who He is. They just refuse to accept Him as their Lord and Savior. They refuse to accept Him into their lives.

You believe that there is one God. You do well. Even the demons believe - and tremble!

James 2:19

Remember you are accepting Jesus as your Lord and Savior. First, you are making Him Lord. Letting Him rule and guide your life - turning your life over to Him, putting Him in control. This is a tremendous relief when you put God Himself in charge of your life. You accept Christ's Lordship of your life - His God-given absolute authority. You then accept Jesus as your Savior. Only Jesus can save you. Only Jesus can give you Salvation (being in heaven with Him).

4) **Belief**- You need to <u>believe</u> that Jesus is the Son of God, the Christ and the Messiah. Faith is what we believe. Christianity is the only belief system that makes sense. No other religion has proof of its validity. Christianity is the <u>only</u> religion that authenticates itself It is the only religion that tells history in advance and then it happens.

From childhood you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for <u>salvation through faith</u> which is in Christ Jesus. All scripture is given by inspiration of God. *2 Timothy 3:15*

Jesus was spoken and written about for thousands of years in the Old Testament. He fulfilled over 300 conditions (requirements) for the Messiah. (See our web page regarding the 300 conditions of the Messiah fulfilled by Jesus.)

Belief is believing that Jesus is who He says He is - the Christ and the Messiah. It is also believing that Jesus is Absolute truth - that who He says He is and what He says is Absolute Truth.

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." *John 14:6*

[Jesus] "He who believes in the Son has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." *John 3:36*

[Jesus] "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me has everlasting life."

John 6:47

5) **Belief without Seeing**— Faith is believing something you have not seen. We have not seen Jesus on earth in our lifetimes, yet we believe that He exists and we believe in Him.

[When Thomas the disciple saw Jesus resurrected from the dead, Jesus said to Thomas:] "Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing." And Thomas answered and said to Him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Thomas, because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." John 20:27-29

These are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name. *John 20:31*

Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. *Hebrews 11:1*

But without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarded of those who diligently seek Him. *Hebrews 11:6*

Our only hope is Jesus Christ. The answer to this life on Earth is that when we die, we can go to heaven and live eternally with Jesus.

Looking for the blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ.

Titus 2:13

Even though we have not seen heaven, we as Christians, believe we are going to heaven because of our faith in Jesus.

Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live. And whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die." *John 11:25-26*

6) *Trust*— You must trust in Jesus. You must have no fear, and you must believe that God will never leave you. He will take care of you, protect you and cause no harm to come to you. You must know that everything will be OK 100%.

In any good relationship, you trust the other person.

That we who first trusted in Christ should be to the praise of His glory. In Him you also trusted, after you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation; in whom also, having believed, you were sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, who is the guarantee of our inheritance.

Ephesians 1:12-14

And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose. *Romans 8:28*

Your relationship with Jesus is one of love, trust and dependence. We know that God will do the right thing for us. He knows what is best for us. Giving your life over to Jesus is a relationship of trust. We know He will never let us down. He will also look out for us, protect us, guide us, comfort us, support us and lead us through life.

A child trusts his or her father. Jesus says in Matthew 6:8, "For your Father knows the things you need before you ask them." You have nothing to fear. God will take care of you.

"So I say to you, ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened... How much more will your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him!" *Luke 11:9-13*

7) **Belief in the Promise**— Jesus has promised us eternal life with Him forever. We believe that Jesus will keep His word and that He will give us the Promise of eternal life.

And this is the promise that He has promised us - eternal life. 1 John 2:25

In hope of eternal life which God, who cannot lie, promised before time began. Titus 1:2

There are three things God can not do:

- 1) He can not learn; He is God.
- 2) He can not lie.
- 3) He can not make us love Him.

God can not lie once, and He knows this. If He lies once, we can never trust Him again. If God lies to us, we can never believe in His promises to us. This belief in the promise that God gives us is so important to God that He actually holds His word above His own name. His word is Absolute Truth.

For You have magnified Your word above all Your name. *Psalm 138:2*

So when God promises you eternal life, by faith in Jesus His Son, you can count on this 100%.

8) **Confidence**— We have confidence in Jesus, that He will never let us down and that He will also do the right thing for us. For example, with a chair we have confidence or faith in that chair. It won't break; it won't let us down.

We have confidence in Christ. We obtain a wonderful sense of security the moment we accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior. The most wonderful feeling in the world is knowing 100% that you are going to heaven and that you are saved.

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. *Ephesians 2:8-9*

This confidence of going to heaven gives the believer such a peace and joy that it is impossible to explain it to a non-believer. The eternal security of salvation to the believer is everything to him or her.

The stresses and hassles of life become extremely minor when you know that life on this Earth is but a very temporary moment and that you are going to live forever with Jesus in heaven.

We are <u>confident</u>, yes, well pleased rather to be absent from the body and to be present with the Lord. *2 Corinthians 5:8*

9) **Knowledge of Christ**— Faith is believing and knowing that Jesus is Absolute Truth and that who He says He is and what He says is Absolute Truth. Complete faith is when you know 100% that Jesus is

Absolute Truth, and our faith grows as Christians. As we get older our relationship with Christ becomes stronger and closer.

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." John 14:6

Then Jesus said to those Jews who believed Him, "If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." *John* 8:31-32

10) **Faithfulness**— You must be loyal to Jesus. Do not follow other false gods. Your allegiance is to God (God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit) - not to Satan, the antichrist or the false prophet. Your loyalty is to the only true living God. Do not follow the enemy called Satan or the enemies of God (such as false religions).

Be faithful to Jesus as Jesus is faithful to you. Revelation describes the Second Coming of Jesus.

Now I saw heaven opened, and behold, a white horse. And He who sat on him was called Faithful and True... He was clothed with a robe dipped in blood, and His name is called The Word of God. *Revelation 19:11.13*

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made. *John 1:1-3*

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth. *John 1:14*

Conclusion - I would like to close this discussion of the ten dimensions of faith with commenting on the most important aspect of faith. That is love.

The highest form of love is agape love. This is the love that Jesus has for you - 100% unconditional deep sacrificial love. Jesus gave His life for you. He died on the cross for you so that you could have salvation (life in heaven). Hopefully your love towards Him grows and develops to the level that you too have agape love for Him (a deep sacrificial love). This love is where you would do anything for Him. This occurs with very advanced faith. Not all Christians reach this level in their faith.

Remember, faith is a growing process that continues to develop in ourselves up to the moment we die and then live with Christ forever.

So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God. *Romans 10:17*

And receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls. *James 1:21*

People need to hear the word of God by ministers or from other Christians who speak and witness to them. Then slowly but surely they come to understand who Jesus is and what salvation is all about. Then suddenly at some point in the individuals life, he or she is ready to <u>accept Jesus</u> as their <u>Lord and Savior</u>. This is the most important moment in a Christians life - his or her salvation - the moment of spiritual birth into eternal life.

As a minister, I have to tell you that this is the most critical decision in your life. It determines where your soul will live for eternity.

For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul?

Mark 8:36

Did you know that you can miss heaven by 1-2 feet? That's the difference between your mind and your heart. You know who Jesus is, but you don't accept Him in your heart. Don't make this mistake. Ask Jesus to come into your life and into your heart.

You must get saved to be in heaven. God wants you to be in heaven. He wants you to be His child, but it is your decision.

Jesus said in John 10:9, "I am the door. If anyone enters by Me, he will be saved." Remember Jesus is the door to heaven and the door knob faces you. You must open the door. You need to make the first move. Salvation is <u>your</u> decision.

Draw near to God and He will draw near to you. James 4:8

Think of an example such as this: you see a great river. You are on one side and heaven is on the other. You need to step towards the river then Jesus will carry you across to salvation. To be in heaven you need to have TGIF - Thank God I'm Forgiven. You want to be a child of God.

Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me. *Revelation 3:20*

Jesus is knocking on the door of your heart. Please let Him in and do it today. Jesus loves you and He wants to be in your life each and every day. Faith in Jesus is all you need to have this happen to you.

Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation. 2 Corinthians 6:2

Salvation Vision

My decision to do ministry with my life began after having this vision of Jesus explaining salvation. Once you see Jesus in a vision, your life entirely changes. I knew from that moment on my life would never be the same.

One evening two years ago, I was reading the New Testament and I got to the part where Jesus died for our sins. It sounded nice but I honestly did not understand it well enough. That night I prayed to God that He would help me understand the concept.

In the middle of the night, while I was sleeping that night, I had the following vision which explained everything. I want to share this experience with you. A vision is something you never forget. It is not a dream, it is much more real - as real as you seeing something in the daytime when you are awake. In fact, in some respects it is more real than this because it is God communicating with you and you will never forget it.

The vision was as follows:

To my left I see an innocent person being hurt by a bad person. The bad person is cutting the innocent person (victim) with a knife - cutting his left and right arms deeply. He was trying to hurt him and maybe kill him.

All of a sudden to my right but also in front of me, I see Jesus coming through an old city gate riding on a donkey.

Jesus' arms left and right were terribly sliced and deeply cut with a tremendous amount of bleeding. I looked at His face and you could see He was suffering severely. You could see that He knew He was going to die, but I also suddenly realized that He was suffering this injury to help the bad guy.

Let me explain.

What is the bad guy's sin or crime? It is hurting the innocent person, cutting the victim with a knife many times for no reason. What is the penalty or punishment for this sin or crime? In Exodus 21:24, the Bible says, "eye for eye, tooth for tooth, wound for wound, stripe for stripe."

Therefore, the punishment for this bad guy's sins is for him to be hurt back the same way he hurt the innocent person. Jesus comes along and says I (Jesus) will <u>take your punishment</u>. I will pay your penalty. I will pay for your sins. In fact, I will die for your sins. However, this is the "deal" - the New Covenant of the New Testament.

If you accept Me (Jesus) as your Lord and Savior, your sins are <u>forgiven</u> and you become a child of God, and you then have Salvation and can go to heaven. All the bad guy has to do is thank Jesus for paying for his sins and accept Jesus in his heart.

The bad guy does not deserve to be in heaven because of his sins. The glories in heaven are so wonderful that he does not deserve to be there, but God the Father gives it to him anyway by grace, <u>as long as</u> he accepts His Son Jesus as his Lord and Savior. This is the covenant of the New Testament.

The bad guy can not just show up in heaven with all his sins (i.e. crash the party without an invitation).

His sins have to be paid for in full. His bill has to be paid for before he can show up in heaven. Jesus paid the bad guy's bill. Sins are considered debt to God, a debt that has to be paid. You can't make this payment - only Jesus can.

Jesus' last words on the cross were "Tetelestai," which means paid in full. Tetelestai is Greek for payment done.

Greek is the original language of the New Testament. In the English translation Jesus says, "It is finished." The exact meaning of Jesus' words is Tetelestai - a <u>debt</u> that is <u>finished</u>. Jesus paid for all man's sins - past, present and future - in full. Payment <u>completed</u> - <u>finished</u>.

An example that helps explain Jesus' last words "tetelestai" is this: During Jesus time, when a man was in prison and finished his prison sentence (paid for his sins in full - took all his punishment), the man was then released and given a document. This was a "debt to society" document which was then immediately stamped with the words Tetelestai - Paid in Full. Then the man was allowed to be free in society.

In our lives on Earth, we are convicted criminals who can not possibly pay for all our sins on earth because we continue to sin up to the moment we die. Our redemption is done by Jesus. He paid for all our sins so that we can go to heaven.

The second part of the vision is as follows:

I am in a prison cell with iron bars for eternity, and I have the feeling that I am never getting out of there. It was the worst feeling I have ever had. Then all of a sudden, I am free and out of the prison cell, and I go to northern Canada. (For some reason, I think of that vast territory as freedom - maybe because of the wide open space that is there.) Then I go to a restaurant to get something to eat, and guess who I see there? The innocent person that was being cut earlier in the vision.

This is salvation - being free and not in prison.

There are 2 categories of people in God the Father's eyes:

- 1) The person who accepts Jesus and his or her sins are <u>forgiven</u> and they become a child of God. They go to heaven.
- 2) The person who does not accept Jesus and his or her sins are <u>not forgiven</u>. They go to hell and then later to Gehenna— the Lake of Fire.

Two categories: 1) child of God, and 2) condemned sinner awaiting punishment. Believe me, you want to be a child of God.

When you accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior, your sins are immediately forgiven and God the Father no longer sees any of your sins. You are immediately made pure and white. Your sins are covered by the blood of Jesus. God the Father sees the blood of Jesus only and does not see your sins anymore.

"Their sins and their lawless deeds I will remember no more." Hebrews 10:17

If the bad guy in this vision truly accepts Jesus in his heart, and is sincere (because God searches the heart to see if you meant it), then the bad guy's sins are forgiven and he becomes a child of God, and he will then live in heaven forever. When the bad guy shows up in heaven he has peace with God the Father because his sins are paid for in full and forgiven. The bad guy kept the covenant (the deal) of the New Testament.

The New Covenant of the New Testament: If you accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior, you live eternally in heaven with God.

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." *John 14:6*

The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" *John 1:29*

If you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. *Romans 10:9*


Prophecies of Jesus in the Old Testament for His First Coming

One of the greatest things that got my attention was the more than 300 conditions and requirements that Jesus fulfilled as the Messiah. It mathematically proved to me that He is who He says He is - the Son of God, the Christ, the Messiah, and the Anointed One.

Not only is Jesus the Son of God, He is God the Son, the Second Person of the Trinity. God Himself came down in the form of a man to teach us about Himself and to die for our sins - to give mankind redemption so that we can go to heaven. The Redemption of man was the reason for the Crucifixion. The entire Bible is about the Redemption of man, the plan of God that will allow a person once again to be reconciled with God and to be at peace with Him in heaven. For this purpose Jesus came down to earth.

Throughout the entire Old Testament the Messiah was prophesied about - the Savior that would come down from heaven to earth teaching mankind about God and the Savior that would save man from his sins.

Jesus' own name means "LORD is Salvation." Prophecy is just history told in advance, God is the only one who knows the entire history of man, the earth, and the universe because He is outside the time dimension. He made time. Time is just a physical property like matter and space. It changes when other variables are changed (e.g. speed of the individual, gravity etc.) Living in eternity is just living outside the time dimension. You in fact have absolutely no perception of time. You constantly live in the present. God, being outside time itself can see the entire history and progression of man through the millenniums.



God sees history as you would see a parade standing high up on a tall building. You see the beginning of the parade and the end of the parade all at the same time.

God says in the book of Isaiah only He knows the end from the beginning.

For I am God, and there is no other; I am God, and there is none like Me, Declaring the end from the beginning, And from ancient times things that are not yet done. *Isaiah 46:9-10*

25% of the Bible is about prophecy (history told in advance). Now remember the entire Bible is inspired by God.

All Scripture is given by inspiration of God. 2 Timothy 3:16

For prophecy never came by the will of man, but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit. 2 Peter 1:21

So for thousands of years, through the prophets in the Old Testament, God told us many times that Jesus His Son would come down to earth and that you would know the Messiah by all the conditions and requirements He fulfilled.

Once I studied this, I now know 100% that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, the Christ. You will soon come to understand that it is mathematically impossible for anyone else to be the Messiah. Also, the beauty of all the prophecies is that it authenticates and validates the text the Bible. No other religion or belief system tells history in advance and then it happens. Prophecy proves to me that the Bible is from God.

God says something will happen and then it happens. Let's talk about Jesus:

Then He [Jesus] said to them, "These are the words which I spoke to you while I was still with you, that all things must be fulfilled which were written in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms concerning Me." And He opened their understanding, that they [the disciples] might comprehend the Scriptures. *Luke 24:44-45*

Then He [Jesus] said to them, "0 foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Ought not the Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into His glory?" And beginning at Moses and all the Prophets, He expounded to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself. *Luke 24:25-27*

Remember, Jesus, God the Son, was with God the Father and God the Holy Spirit before time began. God had to take the form of a man to:

- 1) Teach us about Himself and
- 2) To pay for and die for our sins the Redemption of man

So Jesus came down from heaven to earth and entered our time dimension.

Prophecies in the Old Testament regarding the First Coming of Jesus - The Messiah – Jesus fulfilled all the conditions and requirements of the Messiah written down in the Old Testament thousands of years before they actually happened!

First we will address several of the major prophecies, then later we will list many of the prophecies for your Bible study.

Discussion - Psalm 22 was written by King David in 1000 B.C. The Psalm was written in ink, in black and white, 1000 years before Jesus died on the Cross. It describes the process of crucifixion exactly. Here is the amazing part: crucifixion did not exist during the time period of 1000 B.C. It was invented by the Persians and used by the Romans one thousand years later. During King David's time, people were not put to death by crucifixion, but instead were executed by stoning.

Here in Psalm 22, King David is describing details of the Messiah dying by Crucifixion and this method of execution was not used by mankind until 1000 years later. Also, the event is described as it was happening just then in the present tense and Jesus' exact words were written which were said 1000 years later, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?"

Specific details are documented - the piercing of the hands and feet and the casting lots, the gambling for the clothes of the Messiah. Remember, the Roman soldiers gambled for the clothes of Jesus.

Exact details - all written down 1000 years before they happened.

THE UNPARDONABLE SIN

This is the chapter on blasphemy. I would like to define blasphemy with Webster's Third New International Dictionary: Blasphemy is irreverence towards God. The reviling [despising] of God. The act of claiming the attributes of God.

Blaspheme—to speak with irreverence for God—to speak evil of, to revile. When you study blasphemy throughout the Old Testament and New Testament, it is always done by a nonbeliever. If you want to know what a word means in the Bible, you must study its use throughout the entire Bible. Blasphemy was always done and will be done by the enemies of God. For example, the anti-Christ during the great tribulation in Revelation blasphemes God. This happens when he occupies the temple in Jerusalem and commands people to worship him as God. He says at this time there is no Christian God, instead he is God. This is blasphemy. Blasphemy is denying the purpose, existence and deity of one of the Persons of the Trinity—God the Father, or God the Son or God the Holy Spirit. Remember, blasphemy is done by the nonbeliever, not the believer. Once you understand this, you can easily understand Matthew 12, the unpardonable sin. Matthew 12:32, "Therefore I say to you, every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven man, but the blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven man."

Remember, the Holy Spirit is God, the Holy Spirit and the most important dimension of the purpose of the Holy Spirit is to be Jesus' witness, to teach men and women about Jesus, and to bring the individual to a knowledge and understanding of who Jesus is. The Holy Spirit opens the eyes, ears and heart of the individual to Jesus. Hopefully then, the individual then makes the decision to accept Jesus as their Lord and Savior, and then the person is saved—becomes a believer and immediately obtains salvation. The Holy Spirit always points to Jesus. Now, if the nonbeliever denies the purpose, existence and deity of the Holy Spirit, he or she will not be able to and is unwilling to receive and accept the witness of the Holy Spirit. The nonbeliever instead refuses and rejects the witness of the Holy Spirit about Jesus [by the Holy Spirit Himself or through Christians speaking by the Holy Spirit]. Then of course, this person never gets to know who Jesus is. They, in their lifetime, will never receive and accept Jesus. They stay a nonbeliever and die a condemned sinner. Then in Gehenna, each and every sin of their life is punished, including the unpardonable sin of blaspheming the Holy Spirit. One more obvious point: when a person accepts Jesus and becomes a believer, the Third Person of God immediately indwells [lives inside] the individual. The Holy Spirit seals the individual and never leaves the person. The Holy Spirit is the guarantee of the individual's salvation. The Holy Spirit lives inside the believer. He, the Holy Spirit, is not going to speak and blaspheme against Himself.

The believer is not going to blaspheme the third form of God. 1 Corinthians 12:3, "Therefore I make known to you that <u>no one</u> speaking by the Spirit of God calls Jesus a curse, and no one can say that Jesus is Lord except by the Holy Spirit." The last part of the verse says no one can accept Jesus as his or her Lord and Savior unless it is done by the work of the Holy Spirit. <u>The Holy Spirit brings the individual to Jesus</u>. If the person refuses and rejects the Holy Spirit, he or she will never accept Jesus and they stay a nonbeliever.

Now you are ready to understand the second part of Matthew 12. "Therefore, I say to you every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven men, but the blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven men. Anyone who speaks a word against the Son of Man, it will be forgiven him, but whoever speaks against the Holy Spirit, it will not be forgiven him, either in this age or in the age to come."

Here is the explanation of the second part of Matthew 12:31-32. If the nonbeliever blasphemes Jesus, the Son of Man and speaks against Jesus, there is still the possibility that the witness of the Holy Spirit can work in the individual's life. The nonbeliever can still receive and accept the witness of the Holy Spirit and then accept Jesus as his or her Lord and Savior. Then, this person becomes a believer and every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven. Let me explain this in more detail: In this situation, you must

observe that the person blasphemed Jesus, not the Holy Spirit. Thus, here a person denied the purpose, existence and deity of Jesus.

This person denied that He was the Christ, the Messiah, and the Son of God who died for our sins. Then, the witness of the Holy Spirit was able to transform the nonbeliever to a believer and the individual accepted Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Now as a believer, every sin and blasphemy is forgiven.

Two more observations and you will understand what blasphemy is: The Pharisees accused Jesus of blasphemy. The Jewish leaders unfortunately did not recognize Jesus as their true Messiah. They thought Jesus was committing blasphemy against some future Messiah. In other words, denying the purpose, existence and deity of some future Messiah. Think of an analogy such as this: A father has a son. The son is grounded and then becomes angry with his father and says to the father, "you son-of-a-gun." This is not blasphemy. Blasphemy is if the son was to say to his father, "I deny that you are my father, I deny your purpose and existence as my father." This is a greater offense. Blasphemy is not for some stupid reason, you get mad at God one day for something—blasphemy is when you are a nonbeliever and you deny the purpose, existence and deity of God Himself. If a nonbeliever is reading this chapter right now, whatever you do, do not blaspheme the Holy Spirit; always be willing to hear the witness of the Holy Spirit about Jesus. The Holy Spirit will open your eyes, ears and heart to the truth of Jesus, and Praise God, you will then be able to accept Jesus into your heart.

Jesus says in John 15:26: "But when the Helper [God the Holy Spirit] comes, whom I shall send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who proceeds from the Father, <u>He will testify of Me</u>."

TRANSFORMATION OF THE BELIEVER

10 reasons why you see a change in a Christian

- 1. Faith in Jesus is in your heart.
- 2. You love Jesus.

You do more good works and less bad works, simply because you love Jesus and you want to please Him.

Faith is the relationship you have with Jesus Christ, the most important dimension of faith is the love you have for Jesus.

that if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. Romans 10:9

As your faith and love for Jesus gets stronger you start to sin less and less.

3. Christ is <u>in</u> you. The Second Person of God is physically inside you.

"I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me. I do not set aside the grace of God; for if righteousness comes through the law, then Christ died in vain." Galatians 2:20-21

And if Christ is in you, the body is dead because of sin, but the Spirit is life because of righteousness. *Romans 8:10*

You must be able to see "Jesus in the Man." Jesus on the inside making changes on the outside.

4. Holy Spirit indwells (lives inside) the believer. The Third Person of God is physically inside you.

"And I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever— the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you.

John 14:16-17

5. Born of God = born of the Holy Spirit = born again.
This occurs immediately upon confession of faith in Jesus—the moment you commit to Christ you have a new life as a Christian. You are a new person.

Born Again:

Born of woman (first birth) \rightarrow Born of God (second birth)

Child of woman \rightarrow Child of God

But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe in His name: who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. John 1:12

Second death (lake of fire) → Second life (heaven)





9. Repentance. Turn to Jesus. Turn away from sin.



With salvation, the person turns to Jesus and turns away from sin.
With the Christian walk, the believer keeps walking toward Jesus (gets closer to Jesus) and keeps walking away from sin (keeps separating himself farther away from sin).

10. Sanctification—You become more holy <u>over time</u> through the regeneration power of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit in you does supernatural work on you; constantly changing you for the better throughout your life.



REPENTANCE —Part 1

Webster's dictionary

Repent-To turn from sin out of penitence for past wrong doings, abandon sinful or unworthy purposes and values, and dedicate oneself to the amendment of one's life.

Repentance- The act or process of repenting; contrition for one's sins together with the dedication of oneself to the abandonment of unworthy purposes and values and to the amendment of one's life.

Vines Bible dictionary

Repentance- In the NT the subject chiefly has reference to "repentance" from sin, and this change of mind involves both a turning from sin and a turning to God. The parable of the Prodigal Son is an outstanding illustration of this. Christ began His ministry with a call to "repentance," Matt. 4:17

From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matthew 4:17

Then He said to them, "Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. Luke 24:46-48

"Repent therefore and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out" Acts 3:19

"how I kept back nothing that was helpful, but proclaimed it to you, and taught you publicly and from house to house, testifying to Jews, and also to Greeks, repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ." Acts 20:20-21

"that they should repent, turn to God, and do works befitting repentance."

Acts 26:19-21

"Now, therefore," says the LORD, "Turn to Me with all your heart" Joel 2:12

Now I rejoice, not that you were made sorry, but that your sorrow led to repentance. For you were made sorry in a godly manner, that you might suffer loss from us in nothing. For godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation 2 Corinthians 7:9-10

"Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance." Mark 2:17

Repentance begins with turning to Jesus (accept Him as your Lord and Savior) and turning away from sin.

- Repentance = 1. Turn to God—turn to Jesus—God the Son
 - 2. Turn away from sin
 - 3. Keep walking towards Jesus (Christian walk), your relationship with Jesus gets closer and stronger.
 - 4. Keep walking away from sin (Christian walk), keep separating yourself from sin over time.

I personally believe you must have the power of Jesus to have the strength to separate from the power of sin. And turning away from sin demonstrates that Jesus (God Himself) is in your life. People have told me, "Man you must have Jesus because only God could have changed you."

Turning to God (Jesus) and turning away from sin are two sides of the same coin of Repentance. They both exist together as one. Works consist of good works and bad works. A true Christian will immediately start doing greater good works and less bad works (sin); and this becomes more obvious over time. Faith and works go hand in hand with each other.

I will show you my faith by my works. James 2:18

Faith is the state of your heart and works are the outward manifestation of your heart.

Repentance =

- If you love Jesus you turn to Him. Faith progresses in this order: From belief in Jesus →
 Love Jesus → Accept Jesus → Commitment to Jesus with a confession of faith [Romans 10:9]
- If you love Jesus, you turn away from sin.

"If you love Me, keep My commandments." John 14:15

The sinners prayer is a perfect model for Repentance.

Repentance in your heart:

"I accept and receive You Jesus as my Lord and Savior.

God I know I am a sinner.

God I am sorry I am a sinner.

I turn to You Jesus with all my heart.

Please Jesus forgive all the sins of my life.

All this I confess with my mouth and believe in my heart.

Amen."

<u>Forgiveness</u>: With this Confession of Faith, you immediately have Salvation, the Holy Spirit indwells you and God forgives <u>all</u> the sins of your entire life.

<u>Then, Repentance in deeds</u>: You demonstrate Repentance from sin with your actions and works. You start and continue to sin less and less over time.

Repentance from sin is one of the true signs of saving faith.

- 1. You do not practice sin
- 2. Sin does not rule you
- 3. Sin does not have dominion over you

Sin is not to be your master. Jesus is your Lord.

Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body, that you should obey it in its lusts. And do not present your members as instruments of unrighteousness to sin, but present yourselves to God as being alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness to God. For sin shall not have dominion over you, for you are not under law but under grace. Romans 6:12-14

"Most assuredly, I say to you, whoever commits sin is a slave of sin. And a slave does not abide in the house forever, but a son abides forever." John 8:34-35

I shall mourn for many who have sinned before and have not repented of the uncleanness, fornication, and lewdness which they have practiced.

2 Corinthians 12:21

Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told you in time past, that those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. Galatians 5:19-21

Practical Tip— First start with giving up "ridiculous" sin in your life. For example, false god worship, perverse or "out-of-control" immorality or hurting innocent people. Just keep continuing to turn away from sin. God will give you the strength and ability to repent.

We all struggle with certain sin issues, but we must be sorry for this and keep trying to do better. A Christian will battle with sin until the day he dies, but the Holy Spirit sanctifies us over time. Sanctification by the Holy Spirit is a process where God Himself gives us the power to sin <u>less</u> and do good works; i.e. become more holy.

With Repentance a Christian <u>will not practice sin.</u> He or she will not make sin a habitual continual lifestyle. Jesus calls all sinners to repent.

"For I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."

Matthew 9:13

" 'I never knew; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!' "

Matthew 7:21-23

"'I tell you I do not know you, where you are from. Depart from Me, all you workers of iniquity.'" Luke 13:26-28

Jesus warns you, do not practice lawlessness, do not be a worker of iniquity (sin).

"But if a wicked man turns from all his sins which he has committed, keeps all My statutes, and does what is lawful and right, he shall surely live; he shall not die. None of the transgressions which he has committed shall be remembered against him; because of the righteousness which he has done, he shall live. Do I have any pleasure at all that the wicked should die?" says the Lord God, "and not that he should turn from his ways and live?" Ezekiel 18:21-23

"But when a righteous man turns away from his righteousness and commits iniquity and does according to all the abominations that the wicked man does, shall he live? All the righteousness which he has done shall not be remembered; because of the unfaithfulness of which he is guilty and the sin which he has committed, because of them he shall die. Ezekiel 18:24


<u>Note</u>: you can not sincerely ask for Forgiveness from God for your sin <u>until</u> you <u>first</u> repent of the sin in your heart (turn away from the sin and do not want or intend to do this sin again). You must separate yourself from the sin in your spirit before your ask for Forgiveness.

Remember God knows your heart. He knows if you really plan on not doing this sin again. He knows if you "really mean it" or if you are pretending or "faking it." How can you ask for Forgiveness if you intentionally plan on doing the same sin again or have no desire to stop doing the same sin?

If you are truly sincere and want to stop sinning and turn away from sin then God immediately Forgives you. God does not need to wait until you repent in deed or action because:

- 1) God knows the future and He knows if you truly repent by deeds later
- 2) God knows the intent of your heart and you can not fool Him
- 3) Deeds proceed from the will of the heart. "Cause and Effect"

"For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies." *Matt 15:18-19*



Good heart → Good deeds
Bad heart → Bad deeds
Repentance in heart → Repentance in deeds

No repentance in heart → No repentance in deeds

The heart and deeds are connected. The two go together, they go "hand in hand."

A change in the heart \rightarrow A change in deeds. A change for Good in the heart (R¹) \rightarrow A change for Good in deeds (R²)

God says in Scripture that if a brother sins against you and repents, you must forgive him.

"If your brother sins against you, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him. And if he sins against you seven times in a day, and seven times in a day returns to you, saying, 'I repent,' you shall forgive him." Luke 17:3-4

God <u>always</u> forgives you if you repent of your sins. "Think about it"— if someone sins against you and they truly are sorry and the person does not commit this sin again, you genuinely forgive him. However, on the other hand, if the person continues to commit the same sin against you without repentance, you have a very difficult time forgiving him.

Now hopefully you understand why Scripture states that Repentance is <u>necessary</u> for Forgiveness of sins to occur.

Repentance → Forgiveness
Repentance always <u>precedes</u> Forgiveness

"Repent therefore and be converted that your sins may be blotted out" *Acts 3:19*

"Repent and let everyone of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission [Forgiveness] of sins, and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" Acts 2:38

"Lest they should turn [Repentance]
And their sins be forgiven them" Mark 4:12

Forgiveness always follows Repentance.

"to open their eyes in order to turn them [Repentance] from <u>darkness to light</u>, and from the power of Satan to God that they may receive <u>forgiveness of sins</u>" *Acts* 26:17-18

Jesus opened His ministry with a message of Repentance:

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matt 4:17

"For I did not come to call the righteous, but <u>sinners</u>, to repentance."

Matt 9:13

Jesus closed His ministry with at message of Repentance:

"and that <u>repentance</u> and <u>remission [Forgiveness] of sins</u> should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem"

Luke 24:46-48

Almost every person has a "secret sin" that they need to repent of and turn away from. It can be difficult because the sinner loves his sin, especially his particular characteristic sin. But the sinner must love Jesus more than his sin and choose Jesus over his sin.

GENUINE SAVING FAITH

The biggest crisis in the church today and in a person's spiritual life is whether or not they are truly saved. Christians have been arguing for over 2000 years whether they can or cannot lose their salvation. I tell you this is not the main issue. The <u>real</u> issue is, "Are you saved in the <u>first</u> place?" People need to ask themselves, "Am I really a Christian? Am I really saved?"

Many people who think they are going to heaven are not.

Many people who go to church think they will see Paradise, when in fact, they will see Hell.

"Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them,

"I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!" Matthew 7:21-23

Jesus <u>never</u> knew you means you were <u>never</u> saved in the first place, i.e. you never had a close relationship with Jesus whereby He knew you. Jesus in this passage is talking about people who were denied access to heaven. These people thought they were saved. They thought they were Christians, but in fact were not. They did <u>not</u> have salvation and consequently, they were not accepted into the Kingdom.

The above Bible passage, Matthew 7:21-23, is one of the most serious verses in Scripture. It is what I call a "reality check".

Are you a true Christian or a false Christian?

True Christian—person thinks they are a Christian, and in reality they are a Christian. They→ Heaven.

False Christian—person thinks they are a Christian, but in reality they are not a Christian. They→ Hell.

True Christian	False Christian
True saving faith	Non-saving faith
Saved people	Not saved people
People → Heaven	People → Hell

Hell is real- so much so that Jesus spoke about Hell twice as much as He did about Heaven. Hell is described all throughout Scripture. Heaven and Hell are real. To enter Heaven you must have Genuine Saving Faith: 1) You love Jesus 2) You know Jesus 3) Jesus knows you.

I ask you, "Does Jesus know you? Do you have a close personal relationship with Jesus Christ?" You must be able to say <u>yes</u> to these two questions.

For a person to have True Saving Faith, there must be a change in his or her life— a transformation.

- 1) acts that demonstrate love for Jesus
- 2) acts that demonstrate love for one's neighbor
- 3) acts that demonstrate Repentance from sin
- 4) see fruit of the Holy Spirit. No fruit = not saved and never saved.

"they should repent, turn to God, and do works befitting repentance." Acts 26:20

For as the body without the spirit is dead, so <u>faith without works</u> is <u>dead</u> also.

James 2:26

Works are the outward manifestation of your inner faith in Jesus.

 \uparrow Increasing good works and \downarrow decreasing bad works will show your love for Jesus and your love for your neighbor. Turning away from sin will show your Repentance from sin.

For example, If you love Jesus, you will have an <u>active prayer life</u>. You will talk to Jesus in prayer. When you love someone and have a close personal relationship with them, you talk to them. You tell them, "I love you". Tell Jesus you love Him and mean it from your heart. Plain and simple, if you do not talk (pray) to Jesus you do not have a relationship with Him.

If you truly love Jesus you will tell other people you are a Christian- you will also witness to other people about Jesus. When you fall in love, don't you suddenly tell people you found someone that you are in love with? When I personally chose and confessed Jesus as my Lord and Savior, I simply did so because I love Him. I didn't even know at the time the good news that this confession of faith gave me salvation. I just knew I needed Jesus in my life.

A warning sign of a false Christian is someone who does not tell people he is a Christian. Someone who intentionally "dodges" this issue has a serious problem.

"But whoever denies Me before men, him I will also deny before My Father who is in heaven." *Matthew 10:33*

If you love your neighbor, you will do works that show your love. You will help your neighbor and forgive your brother.

If someone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen, how can he love God whom he has not seen? And this commandment we have from Him: that he who loves God must love his brother also. 1 John: 4:20-21

<u>"For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you.</u> But if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." *Matthew 6:14-15*

Telling people you are a Christian and witnessing to them about Jesus is an act of love for your neighbor. You actually sincerely care whether their soul goes to heaven or hell.

Then He said to them, "Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. And you are witnesses of these things." *Luke 24:46-48*

You praise and worship Jesus. True Christians will praise Jesus in word and in song. You worship Jesus by placing Him in your heart as your Lord and God.

And Thomas answered and said to Him, "My Lord and my God!" John 20:28 You worship God and all Three Persons of the Trinity.

"the true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth; for the Father is seeking such to worship Him." John 4:23

"God is Spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." John 4:24

Whether bowing on your knees or standing with arms lifted high in the air, worship is absolutely necessary in your relationship with Christ.

A Christian during tribulation (tough times) in their life will get closer to Jesus. They will turn to Him for comfort and help.

Repentance from sin must be part of a true Christian's life. Turning away from sin is a powerful sign of saving faith. All Christians undergo sanctification where the Holy Spirit transforms the believer to sin less over time. Within Scripture, the obvious single most important rule regarding sin is that we are not to practice sin. It is true we are all sinners and we battle with sin every day of our lives. However, sin is not to rule us. Sin is not our Master. Jesus is our Lord, not sin.

knowing this, that our old man was crucified with Him, that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves of sin. For he who has died has been freed from sin. *Romans 6:6-7*

Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body, that you should obey it in its lusts. And do not present your members as instruments of unrighteousness to sin, but present yourselves to God as being alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness to God. For sin shall not have dominion over you, for you are not under law but under grace. Romans 6:12-14

"To you first, God, having raised up His Servant Jesus, sent Him to bless you, in turning away ever one of you from your iniquities." Acts 3:26

Jesus answered them, "Most assuredly, I say to you, whoever commits sin is a slave of sin. And a slave does not abide in the house forever, but a son abides forever."

John 8:34-35

Keep back Your servant also from presumptuous sins; Let them not have dominion over me.

Then I shall be blameless,

And I shall be innocent of great transgression. Psalms 19:13

"And if you do well, will you not be accepted? And if you do not do well, sin lies at the door. And its desire is for you, but you should rule over it." Genesis 4:7

Direct my steps by Your word, And let no iniquity have dominion over me. Psalms 119:133

True Christians will not practice sin. False Christians often have sin as their Lord, but they refuse to admit it to themselves.

Whoever or whatever you worship daily is your Lord. It could be money, sex, power, etc. However, a true Christian always puts Jesus <u>first</u> in his or her life and follows Him.

Jesus the Christ— Christian

Lord— Believer that obeys Christ
Master— Servant that serves Christ
Shepherd— Sheep that follows Christ

Jesus is your <u>only</u> Lord, He is your new Boss. If you continually disobey Him, you are not putting Him as Lord of your life.

"But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say?" Luke 6:46

Then one said to Him, "Lord, are there few who are saved?" And He said to them, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I say to you, will seek to enter and will not be able. When once the Master of the house has risen up and shut the door, and you begin to stand outside and knock at the door, saying, "Lord, Lord, open for us," and He will answer and say to you, "I do not know you, where you are from," "

Luke 13:23-25

"then you will begin to say, 'We ate and drank in Your presence, and You taught in our streets.' But He will say, 'I tell you I do not know you, where you are from. Depart from Me, all you workers of iniquity.' There will be weeping and gnashing of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves thrust out." Luke 13:26-28

Do not be a worker of iniquity (sin). Do not practice unrighteousness. Do not make sin a continual willful habitual pattern in your life.

Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told you in time past, that those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. Galatians 5:19-21

Do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived. Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor homosexuals, nor sodomites, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners will inherit the kingdom of God. And such were some of you. But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God. 1 Corinthians 6:9-11

Faith in Jesus gives you salvation and salvation is a free gift from God. <u>However</u>, your life over time must have works that show your faith. <u>Cause (Faith) → Effect (Works)</u>

Thus also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. I will show you my faith by my works. James 2:17-18

The Bible tells you to take your salvation (being saved) very seriously.

work out your own salvation with fear and trembling Philippians 2:12

My final plea to you is this: Be a True Christian with Genuine Saving Faith. Make sure there is Repentance in your life. Please do not be a False Christian who thinks they are going up to heaven, but instead they are doomed to Hell. Having True Saving Faith is the #1 issue in your life today. Make sure Jesus knows you!

- Turns to the Lord with all his heart
- Love for Jesus
- Love for your neighbor
- Forgiveness of your brother
- Being merciful to people
- During tribulation (tough times) you get closer to Jesus
- You praise Jesus in word and in song
- You worship Jesus by placing Him in your heart as your Lord and God
- Getting Water Baptized— Water Baptism is an outward public act showing your inward personal faith. A true Christian will almost always get baptized at sometime in his or her life.
- Does not habitually sin willfully, intentionally, presumptuously and boldly
- Sanctification is observed in person's life. i.e. Becomes more holy over time
- Obedience to Christ

- Person is not characterized as a fornicator or adulterer. (Person who practices fornication or adultery continually in their life without repentance.)
- Not hating your neighbor or brother
- Not falling away from Jesus during tribulation, persecution or temptation
- Person bears fruit
- Person puts Jesus first, then family and friends
- Person puts Jesus first, ahead of cares, riches, pleasures of the world

5 FACTS OF HELL

- 1. Heaven is real. Hell is real.
- 2. If you do not worship Jesus, you go to Hell. Jesus is the <u>only</u> way to Heaven.
 - "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." *John 14:6*
- 3. A lot of good people are in Hell. In my workplace there many doctors that are good people doing good works, but because they do not have Jesus in their heart they are going to Hell.
- 4. People who do not believe in Hell still go to Hell. God makes the rules, not you. There are people who live in a dream-world where they think Hell does not exist; but in reality Hell does exist.
- 5. Remember people who are not truly saved are going to Hell and then to the Lake of Fire to burn for eternity. I can only imagine the shock and terror when a person who thought they were going to Heaven, instead, arrives in Hell. All because they did not have true saving faith and they made the critical mistake of not having a close personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

The Lordship of Christ

Jesus is God. God is Jesus. Jesus is God, Lord and Savior.

And Thomas answered and said to Him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Thomas, because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." *John 20:28-29*

LORD = God and Master of your life = God rules over you. This requires submission of the believer and servant to the will of the only true God.

Christian = Follower of the Christ. To follow Jesus Christ is difficult because it requires the person to make Jesus Lord of his life. This submission by the believer to Jesus is absolutely necessary for salvation.

"Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it."

Matthew 7:13-14

The question I ask as a pastor is: What constitutes only a <u>few</u> find eternal life? I would certainly think less than 10% and probably more like 3, 5 or 7% of people. Understand, of course this percentage number is not for us to know, but this passage definitely warns us to take our salvation seriously.

"Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you: depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!'" Matthew 7:21-23

"But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say? Luke 6:46

"if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved." Romans 10:9

"Do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived. Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor homosexuals, nor sodomites, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners will inherit the kingdom of God." 1 Cor. 6:9-10

Christ continually emphasized the difficulty of following Him. Salvation is by grace alone, but it is not easy. It calls for knowledge of the truth, Repentance, submission to Christ as Lord and a willingness to obey His will and Word. Heaven and Hell is real, and only a few find Heaven. This is why I consider Matt 7:13-14 to be the scariest passage in Scripture. Christianity is not easy and unfortunately most people go to Hell when they die. This is hard for many people to believe, but this is just the way it is. These are God's rules. You must be a true Christian to go to Heaven. Remember if a person practices sin and lawlessness, and makes certain sins a habitual continual lifestyle, they are not saved. Do not make the mistake of creating your own "warm and fuzzy" god with your false rules and not the true living God's rules. As Scripture says, you must:

"work out your own salvation with fear and trembling" Phil 2:12

"For the time has come for judgment to begin at the house of God; and if it begins with us first, what will be the end of those who do not obey the gospel of God? Now

'If the righteous one is scarcely saved,

Where will the ungodly and the sinner appear?'" 1 Peter 4:17-18

Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told you in time past, that those-who-practice-such things-will-not-inherit the kingdom of God. Galatians 5:19-21

Love of money and personal possessions can be such a stumbling block that it actually rejects the person's claim of Jesus' Lordship over his life. It is actually a form of unbelief. We are not to be brought under the power of any particular sin. Sin can and will control you and take over your life if you let it. Do not let sin rule over you.

There are 5 steps of the practice of sin and evil desires:

- 1) The person conceives it in his heart and mind.
- 2) The person acts on it.
- 3) The person practices it as a habitual, intentional, continual lifestyle.
- 4) The person refuses to Repent of it.
- 5) The person is judged on Judgment Day by Jesus and receives eternal punishment in Hell and the Lake of Fire.

Many people think they are saved, but in fact, they are not saved. They struggle with Jesus ruling over their life. Many false Christians love money, sexual immorality, power and possessions more than Jesus; and have these sins as their false god. These sins rule them instead of Jesus. Pride is the worst sin because it separates a person from God. Satan fell away from God because of his pride. With pride, a person is stubborn, self-willed and hard-hearted. They choose to do their will (practice sin) and not do the will of God.

L O R D = God, Lord and Master.

The true Christian submits to the rule of Jesus Christ over his life.

L = Love and Lordship (Submission).

O = Obey God's will and Word.

R = Repentance and Respect.

D = Depend (Trust in God) and Die to self.

Die to self means to do what Jesus wants, not what you want. The believer lives for Christ and not for himself. Sacrifice yourself for Jesus— Carry your cross daily. The Christian identifies with the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Christians are born again when they accept Jesus as their Lord and Savior and are immediately transformed into a new person. They live a Christian life with a desire to serve and please Jesus because they love Him.

Hebrews 6:4-6 and Hebrews 10:26-39 Discussion

Basic Principles of Christianity

Repentance

- 1) Turn to God—draw near to God
- 2) Turn away from sin—separate from sin

Fall Away = The exact opposite of Repentance

- 1) Turn away from God—separate from God (Christ)
- 2) Turn to sin—fall into sin

Just like the Evil Angels who left with Satan, they separated from God fell to earth fell into sin with humans on earth

Hebrews 6:4-6

For it is impossible for those who were once enlightened, and have tasted the heavenly gift, and have become partakers of the Holy Spirit, and have tasted the good word of God and the powers of the age to come, if they fall away, to renew them again to repentance, since they crucify again for themselves the Son of God, and put Him to an open shame.

Heb 6:4-6

This passage addresses the apostate <u>nonbeliever</u> who has received instruction in biblical truth which was accompanied by intellectual perception. Understanding the gospel is not the equivalent of regeneration. It is clear that knowing the truth (enlightenment) is not the equivalent of salvation. This person never makes a spiritual commitment from their heart to Jesus Christ. This individual in fact has seen and heard the full witness of the Holy Spirit about Jesus and yet the person refuses and rejects Christ. No matter what additional information is given or sign and wonder, <u>this nonbeliever</u> will <u>never</u> repent and accept Jesus as his Lord and Savior. There is simply nothing else more than can be said or done to convince this person to Repent and receive the Christ. Note: there is <u>no</u> mention of a person who is a believer, or a person that is saved, holy, born again, righteous, or a saint.

The reader <u>must identify correctly</u> who Paul in Hebrews 6:4-6 is talking about. He is addressing <u>apostates (nonbelievers and False Christians who are nonbelievers)</u> The progression is as follows:

- 1) Apostate nonbeliever sees and hears the complete witness of the Holy Spirit about Jesus
- 2) Yet apostate stills rejects Jesus
- 3) Apostate falls away (separates from Christ), falls into sin
- 4) This particular apostate will <u>never Repent</u>. There is simply no additional information or sign and wonder that will change this person's mind and heart. Nothing else in the future can be done to help this hardened heart
- 5) The apostate views Jesus contemptuously by his actions

Apostates fall into two categories of nonbelievers:

- 1) Obvious false teachers and people who reject the truth and the gospel of Jesus Christ
- 2) False Christians—these are nonbelievers who think they are saved but are not. They never truly spiritually commit to Christ and almost always <u>practice sin</u>, <u>refuse to repent</u> and <u>refuse to obey Christ</u>.

Apostates are individuals who <u>fall away from the gospel</u>. They reject it, abandon it, never fully receive and accept it, rebel against it, refuse to obey the commandments of Jesus, depart from the truth, refuse to live godly, teach false doctrine, practice lawlessness and sin, forsake God, do not fear God, refuse to repent of their sins, will not teach Repentance as part of the gospel, separate themselves from God and are not saved.

In Hebrews 6:4-6, the apostate has <u>full</u> knowledge and <u>full</u> revelation, yet still reject the truth and has no hope of being saved now or in the future. They can never have more knowledge than they had when they rejected Jesus.

There is <u>no</u> possibility of these verses referring to losing salvation. Many passages in Scripture make it obviously clear that salvation is eternal and cannot be lost. (John 10:27-29, Rom 8:35-39, Phil 1:6, 1 Pet 1:4-5). Those who want to make this verse mean that believers can lose salvation will have to admit that it would also say that one could never get it back again. This of course is illogical and therefore Heb 6:4-6 addresses the Non-Christian.

Hebrews 10:26-39

For <u>if we sin willfully</u> after we have received the knowledge of the truth, there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins, but a certain fearful expectation of judgment, and fiery indignation which will devour the adversaries. Anyone who has rejected Moses' law dies without mercy on the testimony of two or three witnesses. Of how much worse punishment, do you suppose, will he be thought worthy who has <u>trampled the Son of God underfoot</u>, counted the blood of the covenant by which he was sanctified a common thing, and insulted the Spirit of grace? For we know Him who said, "Vengeance is Mine, I will repay," says the Lord. And again, "The LORD will judge His people." It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God...

Now the just shall live by faith;

But if anyone draws back.

My soul has no pleasure in him."

But we are not of those who draw back to perdition, but of those who believe to the saving of the soul.

Heb
10:26-39

10:26-39 <u>If we sin willfully</u>

- after we have received the knowledge of the truth
- certain fearful expectation of judgment
- fiery indignation which will devour the adversaries
- worse punishment
- trampled the Son of God underfoot
- counted the blood of the covenant by which he was sanctified a common thing
- insulted the Spirit of Grace
- Vengeance is Mine, I will repay
- The LORD will judge His people. It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God
- If anyone draws back
 - My soul has no pleasure in him
- Draws back to perdition

10:26-39 If we sin willfully

Two possibilities exist with this passage:

1) Some theologians believe this statement refers to the saved person who falls into sin and loses salvation

2) Some theologians believe this statement refers to person who thinks they are saved, but in fact are <u>not</u> saved and were <u>never</u> saved, and then falls into sin. (I personally believe in this 2nd category).

Note: The result is the same whether you believe category 1 or 2 exists. If we sin willfully (fall into sin intentionally and presumptuously without repentance) we are not saved and \rightarrow Hell. It actually does not matter whether you believe category 1 or 2 is real. What matters is: the Bible simply says what it says.

If we sin willfully: we → Hell.

That's all you have to know.

Heb 10:26-39 Spiritual spiral of the apostate

The "we" in 10:26 refers to apostates (False Christians).

10:26 For if <u>we</u> (False Christians) sin willfully after we have received the knowledge of the truth...

10:39 but we (True Christians) are not of <u>those</u> (False Christians) who draw back to perdition (hell & sin)

"If we sin willfully": "we"— The author Paul is speaking rhetorically to make a point. He excludes himself and genuine believers from this category. He later, in verse 10:39, goes on to say, "but we (Paul and genuine believers) are not of those who draw back to perdition." True believers will not be counted among "those" who fall away to destruction and sin.

True Christians do not sin willfully, nor continually fall back into sin. They do not fall away to destruction and Hell. Apostasy is the opposite of faith and the nonbeliever at some point draws back from the knowledge of the gospel and faith. This warning passage (Heb 10:26-39) deals with the sin of apostasy, an intentional falling away or defection. Apostates are those who move toward Christ, hear and understand His gospel, are on the verge of saving belief, but then rebel, turn away and fall away. This warning against apostasy is one of the most serious warnings in all of Scripture.

<u>Sin willfully</u>— to sin deliberately, intentionally, habitually and boldly. This is <u>continual</u> premeditated, presumptuous sinning.

Judas Iscariot was the arch-apostate. A person who had full knowledge of the Christ, yet he lacked faith and rejected Jesus. The apostate is beyond salvation because he has rejected the only sacrifice that can cleanse him from sin.

<u>Trampled the Son of God underfoot, counted the blood of the covenant by which he was sanctified a common thing.</u>

True Christians do not: trample the Son of God underfoot

count the blood of the covenant a common thing

insult the Spirit of grace

To trample is a gesture of severe contempt that demonstrates a complete rejection of Christ as Lord and Savior. To view Christ's blood as something "common" is the same thing as saying that it is unclean or defiled and implies that Christ was a sinner and a blemished sacrifice. Such thinking is blasphemous.

he was sanctified— "he" here refers to Christ. "he" cannot refer to the apostate because only true believers are sanctified.

Rejecting Christ insults the Spirit who testifies of Jesus the Christ.

Apostates can be obvious nonbelievers or they can be more subtle nonbelievers who as false teachers infiltrate the church with false doctrine. This is one of Satan's favorite deceptions. And lastly, Apostates are often False Christians who think they are saved but are not. They were in fact never saved. These people think they do not need Repentance of sin in their life. They incorrectly think they can sin willfully and still go to heaven. In this case, the apostate, False Christian, is a nonbeliever who has been exposed to God's redemptive truth, and perhaps made a profession of faith, but has not exercised genuine saving faith.

With apostasy, there is <u>active rebelling</u> against God, and <u>forsaking</u>, <u>abandoning or falling away</u> from the Gospel and the Commandments of Jesus Christ. The hallmark characteristics of an apostate is immoral behavior, lawlessness, worker of sin and sinning willfully without remorse, without asking for forgiveness from God and without any desire or attempt to Repent.

Jesus spoke of those who believe for a while but "fall away" in time of temptation. These individuals are intellectually persuaded, but never make a spiritual commitment to Jesus. On Judgment Day, those who work iniquity (practice sin and sin willfully) are told by Jesus to "depart" from Him and are not allowed in the kingdom of heaven (Luke 13:27). We are to withdraw from apostates who teach immoral false doctrine (1 Tim 6:3-5). Remember those people who fall away were never saved in the first place. A true believer may stray but then will never totally fall away and God Himself is able to keep the believer from falling (Jude 24). Hebrews 10:26-39 addresses False Christians. A True Christian, a genuine believer, cannot lose their salvation because of their sins. What the reader (you) need to recognize in yourself is: Are you 1) a True Christian or 2) a False Christian that sins willfully without Repentance? The latter person is not saved.

Matthew 7:22-23 Discussion Excerpt from Pastor Bob (Ft. Lauderdale, FL)

"Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!"

Matthew 7:22-23

This is one of the most sobering Scriptures that you will ever read. Jesus is addressing the fact that, in the end, there will be multitudes of men and women expecting Him to welcome them into the kingdom, only to discover that they are not going to get in. The reason is clearly communicated as Christ declares, "I never knew you." Imagine their horrific shock. These are religious people; they talked a lot about God and even did some impressive things under the guise of His name, but they did not personally know Him. Only those who know Jesus will be joining Him in His heavenly kingdom.

Knowing Jesus is one of the necessary qualifications for being part of His Church. As much as it breaks my heart to say this, there are many people today who are **in** the church who aren't **of** it because they don't personally know Jesus. No amount of religious routine or sacrificial service can make someone a member of Christ's body. In fact, a man can even pastor a church that he isn't truly a part of because he doesn't know Christ.

So how can we know that we know Him? For one thing, knowing God means that from time to time you **cry** with Him. In time of crisis, we turn to those that we know best, and those who turn to Jesus in times of hardship and heartache truly know Him. Another indication is that you **sing** to Him. Praise is so precious because it connects us to Christ on a level that's uniquely intimate. Finally, knowing God means that we **talk** to Him on a regular basis. Something is off when a profession for Christ isn't followed by a prayer life. Each of these indicates whether someone is merely in church or truly of it.

Matt 7:13-23

The Narrow Way

"Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it.

You Will Know Them by Their Fruits

"Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravenous wolves. 16 You will know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes from thornbushes or figs from thistles? Even so, every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit. A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor can a bad tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Therefore by their fruits you will know them.

I Never Knew You

"Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!' *Matt 7:13-23*

- **7:13-29** This closing section of the Sermon on the Mount is a gospel application. Here are two gates, two ways, two destinations, and two groups of people (vv. 13,14); two kinds of trees and two kinds of fruit (vv. 17-20); two groups at the judgment (vv. 21-23); and two kinds of builders, building on two kinds of foundations (vv. 24-28). Christ is drawing the line as clearly as possible between the way that leads to destruction and the way which leads to life.
- **7:13,14** Both the narrow gate and the wide gate are assumed to provide the entrance to God's kingdom. Two ways are offered to people. The narrow gate is by faith, only through Christ, constricted and precise. It represents true salvation in God's way that leads to life eternal. The wide gate includes all religions of works and self-righteousness, with no single way (cf. Acts 4:12), but it leads to hell, not heaven.
- 7:14 difficult *is* the way. Christ continually emphasized the difficulty of following Him (10:38; 16:24,25; John 15:18,19;16:1-3; cf. Acts 14:22) Salvation is by grace alone, but it is not easy. It calls for knowledge edge of the truth, repentance, submission to Christ as Lord, and a willingness to obey His will and Word. See notes on 19:16-28.
- **7:15 false prophets.** These deceive not by disguising themselves as sheep, but by impersonating true shepherds. They promote the wide gate and the wide way. **sheep's clothing.** This may refer to the woolen attire that was the characteristic garb of a shepherd.
- **7:16 You will know them by their fruits.** See note on 3:8. False doctrine cannot restrain the flesh, so false prophets manifest wickedness. Cf. 2 Pet. 2:12-22.
- **7:21 Not everyone who says...but he who does.** The barrenness of this sort of faith demonstrates its real character (cf.v. 20)—the faith that says but does not do is really unbelief. Jesus was not suggesting that works are meritorious for salvation, but that true faith will not fail to produce the fruit of good works. This is precisely the point of James 1:22-25; 2:26.
- 7:22 have we not prophesied... cast out demons... and done many wonders. Note that far from being totally devoid of works of any kind, these people were claiming to have done some remarkable signs and wonders. In fact, their whole confidence was in these works—further proof that these works, spectacular as they might have appeared, could not have been authentic. No one so bereft of genuine faith could possibly produce true good works. A bad tree cannot bear good fruit (v.18).
- **7:23 lawlessness.** All sin is lawlessness (1 John 3:4), i.e., rebellion against the law of God (cf. 13:41).

Matt 24:9-13

"Then they will deliver you up to tribulation and kill you, and you will be hated by all nations for My name's sake. And then many will be offended, will betray one another, and will hate one another. Then many false prophets will rise up and deceive many. And because lawlessness will abound, the love of many will grow cold. But he who endures to the end shall be saved. Matt 24:9-13

24:10 many will be offended. Lit. "caused to stumble"—suggesting professing believers who fall away—and even turn against "one another" in shocking acts of spiritual treachery. Those who fall away in such a manner give evidence that they never were true believers at all (see note on v.13). **24:13 endures to the end... be saved.** Cf. 10:22. The ones who persevere are the same ones who are saved—not the ones whose love grows cold (v.12). This does not suggest that our perseverance secures our salvation. Scripture everywhere teaches precisely the opposite. God as part of His saving work, secures our perseverance. True believers "are kept by the power of God through faith for salvation" (1 Pet. 1:5).

The guarantee of our perseverance is built into the New Covenant promise. God says: "I will put My fear in their hearts so that they will not depart from Me" (Jer. 32:40). Those who do fall away from Christ give conclusive proof that they were never truly believers to begin with (1 John 2:19). To say that God secures our perseverance is not to say that we are passive in the process, however. He keeps us "through faith" (1 Pet. 1:5)—our faith. Scripture sometimes calls us to hold fast to our faith" (Heb. 10:23; Rev. 3:11) or warns us against falling away (Heb. 10:26-29). Such admonitions do not negate the many promises that true believers will persevere (John 10:28,29; Rom. 8:38,39; 1 Cor. 1:8,9; Phil. 1:6). Rather, the warnings and pleas are among the means God uses to secure our perseverance in the faith. Notice that the warnings and the promises often appear side by side. For example, when Jude urges believers, "keep yourselves in the love of God" (Jude 21), he immediately points them to God, "who is able to keep you from stumbling" (Jude 24).

Matthew 25:37-46

"Then the righteous will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed *You*, or thirsty and give *You* drink? When did we see You a stranger and take *You* in, or naked and clothe *You*? Or when did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You?' And the King will answer and say to them, 'Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did *it* to one of the least of these My brethren, you did *it* to Me.' "Then He will also say to those on the left hand, 'Depart from Me, you cursed, into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels: for I was hungry and you gave Me no food; I was thirsty and you gave Me no drink; I was a stranger and you did not take Me in, naked and you did not clothe Me, sick and in prison and you did not visit Me.'

"Then they also will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to You?' Then He will answer them, saying, 'Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did not do *it* to one of the least of these, you did not do *it* to Me.' And these will go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life." *Matt* 25:37-46

25:46 everlasting punishment... eternal life. The same Gr word is used in both instances. The punishment of the wicked is as never-ending as the bliss of the righteous. The wicked are not given a second chance, nor are they annihilated. The punishment of the wicked dead is described throughout Scripture as "everlasting fire" (v.41); "unquenchable fire" (3:12); "shame and everlasting contempt" (Dan. 12:2); a place where "their worm does not die, and the fire is not quenched" (Mark 9:44-49); a place of "torments" and "flame" (Luke 16:23,24); "everlasting destruction" (2 Thess. 1:9); a place of torment with "fire and brimstone" where "the smoke of their torment ascends forever and ever" (Rev. 14:10,11); and a "lake of fire and brimstone" where the wicked are "tormented day and night forever and ever" (Rev. 20:10). Here Jesus indicates that the punishment itself is everlasting—not merely the smoke and flames. The wicked are forever subject to the fury and the wrath of God. They consciously suffer shame and contempt and the assaults of an accusing conscience—along with the fiery wrath of an offended deity—for all of eternity. Even hell will acknowledge the perfect justice of God (Ps. 76:10); those who are there will know that their punishment is just and that they alone are to blame (cf. Deut. 32:3-5).

Romans 1:18-3:20

1:18-3:20 After introducing the righteousness which comes from God (1:17), a theme he develops at length (3:21-5:21), Paul presents the overwhelming evidence of man's sinfulness, underscoring how desperately he needs this righteousness that only God can provide. He presents God's case against the irreligious, immoral pagan (1:18-32; the Gentiles) the religious, outwardly moral person (2:1-3:8; the Jews); and concludes by showing that all men alike deserve God's judgment (3:9-20).

1:18 wrath of God. This is not an impulsive outburst of anger aimed capriciously at people whom God does not like. It is the settled, determined response of a righteous God against sin (cf. Pss. 2:5, 12; Rom. 9:22; Eph. 5:6; Col. 3:5.6). is revealed. More accurately, "is constantly revealed." The word essentially means "to uncover, make visible, or make known." God reveals His wrath in two ways: 1) indirectly, through the natural consequences of violating His universal moral law, and 2) directly through His personal intervention (the OT record—from the sentence passed on Adam and Eve to the worldwide flood, from the fire and brimstone that leveled Sodom to the Babylonian captivity— clearly displays this kind of intervention). The most graphic revelation of God's holy wrath and hatred against sin was when He poured out divine judgment on His Son on the cross. God has various kinds of wrath: 1) eternal wrath, which is hell; 2) eschatological wrath, which is the final Day of the Lord; 3) cataclysmic wrath like the flood and the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah; 4) consequential wrath, which is the principle of sowing and reaping; and 5) the wrath of abandonment, which is removing restraint and letting people go to their sins (for examples of this wrath, see Ps. 81:11,12; Prov. 1:23-31; see note on Hos. 4:17). Here, it is that fifth form, God's abandoning the wicked continually through history to pursue their sin and its consequences (vv. 24-32). ungodliness. This indicates a lack of reverence for, devotion to, and worship of the true God— a defective relationship with Him (cf. Jude 14,15). unrighteousness. This refers to the result of ungodliness: a lack of conformity in thought, word, and deed to the character and law of God (see note on 1:17). suppress the truth. Although, the evidence from conscience (1:19-2:14), creation (1:20), and God's Word is irrefutable, men choose to resist and oppose God's truth by holding fast to their sin (cf. Ps. 14:1; John 3:19,20).

1:19 is manifest in them. God has sovereignty planted evidence of His existence in the very nature of man by reason and moral law (1:20,21,28,32;2:15).

1:20 invisible attributes. This refers specifically to the two mentioned in this verse. by the things that are made. The creation delivers a clear, unmistakable message about God's person (cf. Pss. 19:1-8; 94:9; Acts 14:15-17; 17:23-28). His eternal power. The Creator, who made all that we see around us and constantly sustains it, must be a being of awesome power. Godhead. That is, His divine nature, particularly His faithfulness (Gen. 8:21,22), kindness, and graciousness (Acts 14:17). they are without excuse. God holds all men responsible for their refusal to acknowledge what He has shown them of Himself in His creation. Even those who have never had an opportunity to hear the gospel have received a clear witness about the existence and character of God— and have suppressed it. If a person will respond to the revelation he has, even if it is solely natural revelation, God will provide some means for that person to hear the gospel (cf. Acts 8:26-39; 10:1-48; 17:27).

1:21 knew God. Man is conscious of God's existence, power, and divine nature through general revelation (vv. 19,20). they did not glorify *Him.* Man's chief end is to glorify God (Lev. 10:3; 1 Chr. 16:24-29; Ps. 148; Rom. 15:5,6), and Scripture constantly demands it (Ps. 29:1,2; 1 Cor. 10:31; Rev. 4:11). To glorify Him is to honor Him, to acknowledge His attributes, and to praise Him for His perfections (cf. Ex. 34:5-7). It is to recognize His glory and extol Him for it. Failing to give Him glory is man's greatest affront to his Creator (Acts 12:22,23). nor were thankful. They refused to acknowledge that every good thing they enjoyed came from God (Matt. 5:45; Acts 14:15-17; 1 Tim. 6:17; James 1:17). futile. Man's search for meaning and

purpose will produce only vain, meaningless conclusions. **hearts were darkened.** When man rejects the truth, the darkness of spiritual falsehood replaces it (cf. John 3:19,20).

1:22 Professing to be wise, they became fools. Man rationalizes his sin and proves his utter foolishness by devising and believing his own philosophies about God, the universe, and himself (cf. Pss. 14:1;53:1).

Romans

- **1:23 changed the glory...into an image.** They substitute the worship of idols for the worship of the true God.
- **1:24-32** This section describes the downward spiral of the wrath of abandonment (see note on v.18) in the life of man when God abandons him. Paul shows the essence (vv. 24,25), the expression (vv. 26,27), and the extent (vv. 28-32) of man's sinfulness.
- **1:24 God also gave them up.** This is a judicial term in Gr., used for handing over a prisoner to his sentence. When men consistently abandon God, He will abandon them (cf. Judg. 10:13; 2 Chr. 15:2; 24:20; Ps. 81:11,12; Hos. 4:17; Matt. 15:14; Act 7:38-42; 14:16). He accomplishes this 1) indirectly and immediately, by removing His restraint and allowing their sin to run its inevitable course, and 2) directly and eventually, by specific acts of divine judgment and punishment. **uncleanness.** A general term often used of decaying matter, like the contents of a grace. It speaks here of sexual immorality (2 Cor. 12:21; cf. Gal. 5:19-23; Eph. 5:3; 1 Thess. 4:7), which begins in the heart and moves to the shame of the body.
- 1:25 the lie. A denial of God's existence and His right to be obeyed and glorified (vv. 19-21; Is. 44:20; Jer. 13:25; cf. John 8:44).
- **1:26 God gave them up.** See notes on vv. 18,24. vile passions. Identified in vv. 26,27 as homosexuality, a sin roundly condemned in Scripture (Gen. 19; Lev. 18:22; 1 Cor. 6:9-11; cf. Gal. 5:19-21; Eph. 5:3-5; 1 Tim. 1:9,10; Jude 7). **women**. Rather than the normal Gr. term for women, this is a general word for female. Paul mentions women first to show the extent of debauchery under the wrath of abandonment, because in most cultures women are the last to be affected by moral collapse.
- **1:27 receiving in themselves the penalty.** Here the law of sowing and reaping (Gal. 6:7,8) takes effect, as Paul refers to the self-destructive nature of this sin, of which AIDS is one frightening evidence.
- **1:28 God gave them over.** See notes on 1:18,24. **debased**. This translates a Gr. word that means "not passing the test." It was often used to describe useless, worthless metals, discarded because they contained too much impurity. God has tested man's minds and found them worthless and useless (cf. Jer. 6:30).
 - **1:32 knowing.** Not ignorance, but blatant rebellion (see note on 2:15).
- **2:1-16** Having demonstrated the sinfulness of the immoral pagan (1:18-32), Paul presents his case against the religious moralist— Jew or Gentile— by cataloging 6 principles that govern God's judgment: 1) knowledge (v.1); 2) truth (vv. 2,3); 3) guilt (vv. 4,5); 4) deeds (vv.6-10); 5) impartiality (vv. 11-15); and 6) motive (v.16).

Romans 3:21-26

But now the righteousness of God apart from the law is revealed, being witnessed by the Law and the Prophets, even the righteousness of God, through <u>faith in Jesus Christ</u>, to all and on all who believe. For there is no difference; for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God set forth as a propitiation by His blood, through faith, to demonstrate His righteousness, because in His forbearance God had passed over the sins that were previously committed, to demonstrate at the present time His righteousness, that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has <u>faith</u> in Jesus. *Romans* 3:21-26

- **3:22,23 there is no difference... glory of God.** A parenthetical comment explaining that God can bestow His righteousness on all who believe, Jew or Gentile, because all men—without distinction—fail miserably to live up to the divine standard.
 - 3:23 all have sinned. Paul has already made this case (1:18-3:20).
- **3:24 justified.** This verb, and related words from the same Gr. root (e.g., justification), occur some 30 times in Romans and are concentrated in 2:13-5:1. This legal or forensic term comes from the Gr. word for "righteous" and means "to declare righteous." This verdict includes: pardon from the guilt and penalty of sin, and the imputation of Christ's righteousness to the believer's account, which provides for the positive righteousness man needs to be accepted by God. God declares a sinner righteous solely on the basis of the merits of Christ's righteousness. God imputed a believer's sin to Christ's account in His sacrificial death (Is. 53:4,5; 1 Pet. 2:24), and He imputes Christ's perfect obedience to God's law to Christians (cf. 5:19; 1 Cor. 1:30; see notes on 2 Cor. 5:21; Phil. 3:9). The sinner receives this gift of God's grace by faith alone (3:22,25; see notes on 4:1-25). Sanctification, the work of God by which He makes righteous those whom He has already justified, is distinct from justification but without exception, always follows it (8:30). freely by His grace. Justification is a gracious gift God extends to the repentant, believing sinner, wholly apart from human merit of work (see note on 1:5). redemption. The imagery behind this Gr. word comes from the ancient slave market. It meant paying the necessary ransom to obtain the prisoner or slave's release. The only adequate payment to redeem sinners from sin's slavery and its deserved punishment [Hell] was "in Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:6; 1 Pet 1:18,19), and was paid to God to satisfy His justice.
- **3:25 whom God set forth.** This great sacrifice was not accomplished in secret, but God publicly displayed His Son on Calvary for all to see. **propitiation.** Crucial to the significance of Christ's sacrifice, this word carries the idea of appeasement or satisfaction—in this case Christ's violent death satisfied the offended holiness and wrath of God against those for whom Christ died (Is. 53:11; Col. 2:11-14). The Heb. equivalent of this word was used to describe the mercy seat—the cover to the ark of the covenant—where the High-Priest sprinkled the blood of the slaughtered animal on the Day of Atonement to make atonement for the sins of the people. In pagan religions, it is the worshiper not the god who is responsible to appease the wrath of the offended deity. But in reality, man is incapable of satisfying God's justice apart from Christ, except by spending eternity in hell. Cf. 1 John 2:2.
- **3:26 to demonstrate... His righteousness.** Through the incarnation, sinless life, and substitutionary death of Christ. **just and the justifier.** The wisdom of God's plan allowed Him to punish Jesus in the place of sinners and thereby justify those who are guilty without compromising His justice.

1 Corinthians 6:9-11

⁹ Do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived. Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor homosexuals, nor sodomites, ¹⁰ nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners will inherit the kingdom of God. ¹¹ And such were some of you. But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God.

6:9,10 This catalog of sins, though not exhaustive, represents the major types of moral sin that characterize the unsaved.

6:9 not inherit the kingdom. The kingdom is the spiritual sphere of salvation where God rules over all who belong to Him by faith (*see notes on Matt. 5:3,10*). All believers are in that spiritual kingdom, yet are waiting to enter into the full inheritance of it in the age to come. People who are characterized by these iniquities are not saved (v.10). See notes on 1 John 3:9,10. While believers can and do commit these sins, they do not characterize them as an unbroken life pattern. When they do, it demonstrates that the person is not in God's kingdom. True believers who do sin, resent that sin and seek to gain the victory over it (cf. Rom. 7:14-25). **fornicators.** All who indulge in sexual immorality, but particularly unmarried persons. **idolaters.** Those who worship any false god or follow any false religious system. **adulterers.** Married persons who indulge in sexual acts outside their marriage. **homosexuals...sodomites.** These terms refer to those who exchange and corrupt normal male-female sexual roles and relations. Transvestism, sex changes, and other gender perversions are included (cf. Gen. 1:27; Deut. 22:5). Sodomites are so-called because the sin of male-male sex dominated the city of Sodom (Gen. 18:20; 19:4,5). This sinful perversion is condemned always, in any form, by Scripture (cf. Lev. 18:22; 20:13; Rom. 1:26,27; 1 Tim. 1:10).

6:10 thieves...covetous. Both are guilty of the same basic sin of greed. Those who are covetous desire what belongs to others; thieves actually take it. **revilers.** People who try to destroy others with words. **extortioners.** Swindlers and embezzlers who steal indirectly, taking unfair advantage of others for their own financial gain.

6:11 some of you. Though not all Christians have been guilty of all those particular sins, every Christian is equally an ex-sinner, since Christ came to save sinners (cf. Matt. 9:13; Rom. 5:20). Some who used to have those patterns of sinful life were falling into those old sins again, and needed reminding that if they went all the way back to live as they used to, they were not going to inherit eternal salvation, because it would indicate that they never were saved (cf. 2 Cor. 5:17). **washed.** Refers to new life, through spiritual cleansing and regeneration (cf. John 3:3-8; 2 Cor. 5:17; Eph 2:10; Titus 3:5). **sanctified.** This results in new behavior, which a transformed life always produces. Sin's total domination is broken and replaced by a new pattern of obedience and holiness. Through not perfection, this is a new direction (see Rom. 6:17, 18,22). **justified.** This refers to a new standing before God, in which the Christian is clothed in Christ's righteousness. In His death, the believer's sins were put to His account and He suffered for them, so that His righteousness might be put to an account, so that we might be blessed for it (Rom. 3:26, 4:22-25; 2 Cor. 5:21; Phil. 3:8,9; 1 Pet. 3:18). **by the Spirit.** The Holy Spirit is the agent of salvation's transformation (cf. John 3:3-5).

2 Corinthians 5:17

¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone *is* in Christ, *he is* a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new.

5:17 in Christ. These two words comprise a brief but most profound statement of the inexhaustible significance of the believer's redemption, which includes the following: 1) the believer's security in Christ, who bore in His body God's judgment against sin; 2) the believer's acceptance in Him with whom God alone is well pleased; 3) the believer's future assurance in Him who is the resurrection to eternal life and the sole guarantor of the believer's inheritance in heaven; and 4) the believer's participation in the divine nature of Christ, the everlasting Word (cf. 2 Pet. 1:4). new creation. This describes something that is created at a qualitatively new level of excellence. It refers to regeneration or the new birth (cf. John 3:3; Eph. 2:1-3; Titus 3:5; 1 Pet. 1:23; 1 John 2:29; 3:9; 5:4). This expression encompasses the Christian's forgiveness of sins paid for in Christ's substitutionary death (cf. Gal, 6:15; Eph. 4:24). old things have passed away. After a person is regenerate, old value systems, priorities, beliefs, loves, and plans are gone. Evil and sin are still present, but the believer sees them in a new perspective (see note on v. 16), and they no longer control him. all things...new. The Gr. grammar indicates that this newness is a continuing condition of fact. The believer's new spiritual perception of everything is a constant reality for him, and he now lives for eternity, not temporal things. James identifies this transformation as the faith that produces works (see notes on Eph. 2:10; James 2:14-26).

1 Thessalonians 4:14-18

For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who sleep in Jesus. For this we say to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive and remain until the coming of the Lord will by no means precede those who are asleep. For the Lord Himself will descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of an archangel, and with the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And thus we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore comfort one another with these words. *1 Thess. 4:14-18*

4:17 **caught up.** After the dead come forth, their spirits, already with the Lord (2 Cor. 5-8; Phil. 1:23), are now being joined to resurrected new bodies (*see notes on 1 Cor. 15:35-50*); the living Christians will be raptured, lit. snatched away (cf. John 10:28; Acts 8:39). This passage along with John 14:1-3 and 1 Cor. 15:51,52, forms the biblical basis for "the Rapture" of the church. The time of the Rapture cannot be conclusively determined from this passage alone. However, when other texts such as Rev. 3:10 and John 14:3 are consulted and compared to the texts about Christ's coming in judgment (Matt. 13:34-50; 24:29-44; Rev. 19:11-21) at the end of a 7 year tribulation, it has to be noted that there is a clear difference between the character of the "Rapture" in that there is no mention of any judgment, while the other texts feature judgment. So then, it is best to understand that the Rapture occurs at a time different from the coming of Christ in judgment. Thus, the Rapture has been described as pretribulational (before the wrath of God unfolded in the judgments of Rev. 6-19). This event includes complete transformation (cf. 1 Cor. 15:51-52; Phil. 3:20,21) and union with the Lord Jesus Christ that never ends.

1 Thess. 5:2-5:3

5:2 day of the Lord. There are 19 indisputable uses of "the Day of the Lord" in the OT and 4 in the NT (cf. Acts 2:20; 2 Thess. 2:2; 2 Pet. 3:10). The OT prophets used "Day of the Lord" to describe near historical judgments (see Is. 13:6-22; Ezek. 30:2-19; Joel 1:15; Amos 5:18-20; Zeph. 1:14-18) or far eschatological divine judgments (see Joel 2:30-32; 3:14; Zech. 14:1; Mal. 4:1,5). Six times it is referred to as the "day of doom" and 4 times "day of vengeance." The NT calls it a day of "wrath," day of "visitation," and the "great day of God Almighty" (Rev. 16:14). These are terrifying judgments from God (cf. Joel 2:30,31; 2 Thess. 1:7-10) for the overwhelming sinfulness of the world. The future "Day of the Lord" which unleashes God's wrath, falls into two parts: 1) the end of the 7 year tribulation period (cf. Rev. 19:11-21), and 2) the end of the Millennium. These two are actually 1,000 years apart and Peter refers to the end of 1,000 year period in connection with the final "day of the Lord" (cf. 2 Pet. 3:10; Rev. 20:7-15). Here, Paul refers to that aspect of the "Day of the Lord" which concludes the tribulation period. a thief in the night. This phrase is never used to refer to the rapture of the church. It is used of Christ's coming in judgment on the Day of the Lord at the end of the 7 year tribulation which is distinct from the rapture of the church (see note on 4:15) and it is used of the judgment which concludes the Millennium (2 Pet. 3:10). As a thief comes unexpectedly and without warning, so will the Day of the Lord come in both its final phases.

5:3 "Peace and safety!" Just a false prophets of old fraudulently forecast a bright future, in spite of the imminence of God's judgment (Jer. 6:14; 8;11; 14:13,14; Lam. 2:14; Ezek. 13:10,16; Mic. 3:5), so they will again in future days just before the final Day of the Lord destruction. **labor pains.** The Lord used this same illustration in the Olivet Discourse (*see note on Matt. 24:8*). It portrays the inevitability, suddenness, inescapable nature, and painfulness of the Day of the Lord.

1 Peter 1:4-5

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His abundant mercy has begotten us again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance incorruptible and undefiled and that does not fade away, reserved in heaven for you, who are kept by the power of God through faith for salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. 1 Peter 1:3-5

1:5 Kept by the power of God. Supreme power, omniscience, omnipotence and sovereignty, not only keep the inheritance (v. 4) but also keep the believer secure. No one can steal the Christian's treasure, and no one can disqualify him from receiving it. (see notes on Rom. 8:31-39). through faith. The Christian's response to God's election and the Spirit's conviction is faith, but even faith is empowered by God. (See note on Eph. 2:8). Moreover, the Christians continued faith in God is the evidence of God's keeping power. At the time of salvation, God energizes faith, and continues to preserve it. Saving faith is permanent; it never dies. (See notes on Matt. 24:13, Heb. 3:14).

2 Peter 2:20-22

For if, after they have escaped the pollutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, they are again entangled in them and overcome, the latter end is worse for them than the beginning. For it would have been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than having known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered to them. But it has happened to them according to the true proverb: "A dog returns to his own vomit," and, "a sow, having washed, to her wallowing in the mire." 2 Pet. 2:20-22

2:20 escaped the pollutions of the world. "Pollutions" has the idea of putrid or poisonous vapors. Morally, the world gives off a deadly influence. Peter notes that at some point in time, these false teachers and their followers wanted to escape the moral contamination of the world system and sought religion, even Jesus Christ (on their terms, not His). But these false teachers had <u>never genuinely been converted to Christ</u>. They heard the true gospel and moved toward it, but then rejected the Christ of that gospel. That is apostasy, like the people of Heb. 10:26-27. Their last end is far worse than the first.

2:21 to turn from the holy commandment. Lit., "to turn back." This verse describes the perversion and defection of the false teachers. They professed the Christian experience (the way of righteousness; cf. Matt 21:32) and even had access to the true teachings of Scripture. But by their lives they demonstrated that they ultimately had chosen to reject Christ (cf. Heb. 10:26-31). Such false teachers as Peter was describing were not made outside Christianity. They are always bred in the church, half in and half out; but eventually they reject the truth and try to seduce others in their attempt to fulfill their self-gratification.

REPENTANCE

Luke 24:46-47

Then He said to them, "Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem.

Matt 6:9-13

On the morning of 11/4/06 at 7:30 am, God woke me up and told me to go to the "Lord's Prayer" and put myself in the prayer and to especially refer to the "Forgiveness" part.

"And forgive us our sins
As we forgive those who sin against us" *Matt 6:12*

God told me to personally identify and confess my particular sins and ask Him to specifically forgive me. Then He told me to tell Him which people in my life are sinning against me, what their sins are, and most importantly how I am forgiving them. God told me I had to forgive them.

The critical message of the "Lord's Prayer" is <u>Forgiveness</u>. That is why immediately following the Model Prayer, God commands us that we must forgive as He forgives us.

"For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." *Matt 6:14-15*

On November 4, 2006 at 7:30 am, the Lord tells me out of all the verses in the Bible to go specifically to the "Lord's Prayer" and address forgiveness within the prayer and to make it personal—how it applies to my life—to put myself into the prayer.

Here comes an amazing confirmation:

Denise, the administrator to our church runs over to my medical office on the morning of 11/4/06 and tells me God gave her a word at 8 am while she was praying. God told her to tell me to go to the Lord's Prayer and to specifically personalize it; to put myself in the prayer.

What are the odds that two people independently receive the exact message from God at two different locations at the same time on the same day to specifically go to one Bible passage in Scripture and to personalize it in exactly the same way?

Wow! God is an amazing God, a loving God and forgiving God. The fact that He gets involved in every second of every day in my life and our lives is beyond my understanding. I thank God and love Him that He loves me that much.

Personalize the Lord's Prayer—put yourself in it:

My Father in heaven,
Holy be Your name.
Your kingdom come.
Your will be done in my life
On earth as it is in heaven.
Give me this day my daily bread.

- 1 And forgive me my sins,
- 2 As I forgive those who sin against me.

And do not lead me into temptation,

But <u>deliver me</u> from the evil one.

For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

1— Identify and Confess your personal sins to the Father and ask God to forgive you of each of the sins you confess to Him. Ongoing confessions of sins to God cleanses you and helps sanctify you and makes you more holy and pursue a life of righteousness. Personally identifying your sins, telling God you are genuinely sorry and asking to be forgiven helps you to Repent from these specific sins and brings your personal relationship to God much closer.

2—Identify the specific people who are sinning against you, what their sins are, and more importantly tell God and show God how you are forgiving them. God knows their sins. He just wants to see you forgive them. You must forgive as God forgives you.

God forgives all the sins of a believer's life. The least you can do is forgive one or two sins that a particular brother or sister has done against you.

Remember Redemption and Forgiveness of all your sins in life occurs of the moment of Salvation [the moment you accept and receive Jesus Christ into your heart as your Lord and Savior] When a person is saved, he is justified eternally— <u>forever forgiven</u> and deemed righteous by the righteousness of Jesus through the blood of the Lamb.

Holy Spirit inspired personalized Lord's Prayer for me:

My Father in heaven, Dearest Father who I am in love with,

Holy be Your name.

Your kingdom come.

Your will be done in my life for my life,

On earth as it is in heaven.

Father I want to do Your will not mine. I want to be more holy.

I want to turn away from sin. Please help me do this.

Father, please give me my daily bread. I have needs... [identify my daily needs]

And please forgive my sins for I have many.

I have sinned against You. I have done... [identify and confess my sins]

As I forgive... [identify sinning brothers and sisters I am forgiving]

who has done... [identify their sins I am forgiving]

Lord Jesus give me the strength to forgive. It is difficult for me.

Lord strengthen my faith and my doubt at times.

And most of all, please give me strength to forgive this person and these people. And do not lead me into temptation,

Father keep me away from... [identify my temptations]

This is my secret sin, my characteristic sin and I need help. I can't do it on my own. Please strengthen me to turn away from this sin, this temptation.

Please put this temptation away from me and most of all <u>keep me away</u> from this temptation. The devil is putting it right in front of me. Father deliver me from Satan.

I do not want to be a child of the devil.


I want to be in heaven Father, Your kingdom, not Hell.

WE BELIEVE:



SANCTIFICATION

Sanctification is the active process whereby a believer is made more holy by the Holy Spirit within him over time. It is the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit in producing righteousness in the believer. Fruit of the Holy Spirit are visible signs of sanctification. Every believer undergoes sanctification. If there is no sanctification, no change in the believer, then this person does not have the Holy Spirit in him and he is not saved. There must be a change in the believer with ↑ good works and ↓ bad works. You see love for Jesus, love for neighbor, forgiveness of brother and ↓ sin over time. The believer does not practice sin as he used to. He does not seek to do sin. He runs to Jesus instead of sin. He undergoes conviction of sin by the Holy Spirit. He knows when he is sinning too much. He feels remorse for his sins and repents. He does not stay in sin. He does not live in sin. He does not fall into sin and stay there. He repents when he backslides. All Christians backslide, but then through the active working power of the Holy Spirit, they repent—they have the strength and desire to repent because the Holy Spirit is in them—Jesus is in them.

Justification is freedom from the penalty of sin. Sanctification is freedom from the power of sin. Sin no longer rules you, no longer is your lord—no longer has dominion over you. You are a slave of Jesus and no longer the slave of sin. You are bought for a price by Jesus at the slave market of sin.

Glorification occurs after you die and live in heaven. It is freedom from the presence of sin. We, like Jesus, are totally sinless—without sin completely. In Sanctification, God gives us the power of the Holy Spirit to say no to sin. There is a spiritual transformation—a metamorphosis of the believer (Metaneo) a complete turning to Jesus and at the same time, turning away from the lordship of sin. The Holy Spirit makes us want to be more holy, makes us want not to sin, not to seek sin, not to live in sin, we want to change. We don't want to practice sin. We may still have the desire to live and practice our secret sin, but we don't act on it. This is the difference between a saved person and a person who thinks he is saved, but is not. The saved person repents from his secret sin. He may still have the desire for his sinful lifestyle, but he does not and no longer acts on it. Whereas, the false Christian who is not saved, refuses to repent, stays in rebellion and continues to practice his secret sin. He chooses his sin over Jesus. He loves his sin more than he loves Jesus. He refuses to submit to the Lordship of Christ and instead submits and surrenders to the lordship of his sin.

Also in sanctification, the true believer listens to the witness and testimony of the Holy Spirit spoken by other Christians guided by the Holy Spirit. The believer then changes his behavior. Of course, Scripture itself, which was written by the Holy Spirit causes the believer to change. A true Christian suddenly notices that they are not the same person they used to be, they are born again. Don't you see it in your own life? Suddenly you are not the hater you used to be. You can't stay mad at someone, you forgive them and honestly don't know why (although you do know it is the work of the Holy Spirit and Jesus in you). You love when you normally would not love.

You give and lend and help others. You actually love your neighbor and again you don't know why in the worldly sense, but you understand why in the spiritual sense. You suddenly don't swear as much. You don't go drinking and drugging like you used to. You don't practice fornication and adultery like you used to. You can't completely explain it, but it just happens. Jesus <u>broke the power of sin</u> in our lives and we are led by the Spirit—we are no longer led by the flesh. In sanctification, we are set apart from the world to pursue righteousness, holiness and obedience to Christ. The nonbeliever in the world never changes. The believer in Christ does change and continues to change for the better. I tell you, a person who says he is saved and yet absolutely does not change, and keeps on sinning as much as he used to and sometimes more, is <u>not saved</u>. He is an apostate who falsely believes false doctrine that he does not have to repent.

Jesus continually preached repentance. His first message in ministry was repentance (Matt 4:17). His last message in ministry was repentance (Luke 24:46-48). The spirit of the true Christian is constantly renewed for the better—made more holy over time. The Holy Spirit constantly convicts you when you sin. You feel sorrow and remorse and you repent. Again, a believer can still have the desires of practicing sin but he does not act on them and certainly does not practice them. Scripture is real simple. It simply says what it says. People who practice sin and especially certain sins (1 Cor 6:9-11) → Hell. Scripture is black and white, yet false Christians think they can live in the gray. They make up their own rules, their own law. When instead, they should follow the law and commandments of Jesus Christ. If you truly love Jesus and have agape love for Jesus—sacrificial, selfless, giving love for Jesus, you will not practice sin. You don't want to hurt Jesus. You want to please Him. You don't fall away into sin and separate from Jesus, you instead get closer to Him over time and remain in relationship, in communion, in fellowship with Him. A true Christian says, "I love the Lord!"

We need to "read the red" (words of Jesus in the Bible) and "live in the red" (the blood of Christ and the words of Jesus) and "stay under the red"—under the blood of Jesus.

People who practice sin clearly → Hell and not Heaven. People who practice lawlessness and are workers of iniquity surely → Hell (Matt 7:13-22 & Luke 13:23-28).

Examine yourself:

do you practice sin?

do you refuse to repent of sin and from sin?

do you stay in sin?

do you live in sin?

do you have sin as your characteristic habitual lifestyle?

have you fallen into sin and refuse to repent of sin?

are you living in rebellion rather than living in Christ?

are you led by the flesh and not by the Holy Spirit?

is there no holiness in your life and all you see is sin?

is there no change, no transformation, no metamorphosis in your life?

If these questions apply to you, then you need to repent ASAP AFAP. You never know how long you have on earth. Don't just think you are saved—instead know you are saved! There must be repentance in your life. Jesus <u>came to call sinners to repentance</u>. "For I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance." (Matt 9:13). "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matt 4:17). There must be repentance in your life. Paul says in Romans: "Shall we continue to sin? Certainly Not!"

Jesus says, "If you love Me, keep My commandments" (John 14:15) and also says, "But why do you call Me 'Lord, Lord,' and not do the things which I say?" (Luke 6:46).

Matt 7:21-23 "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!" (Note exclamation! mark in Scripture).

Why take the chance? ... Repent instead, play it safe. Don't follow greasy grace—license to sin doctrine. It's too dangerous. Your spiritual life is at stake!

Jesus came to call sinners to repent

When Jesus heard that, He said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy and not sacrifice.' For I did not come to <u>call</u> the righteous, but <u>sinners</u>, to <u>repentance</u>." *Matt 9:12-13*

When Jesus heard it, He said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I did not come to <u>call</u> the righteous, but <u>sinners</u>, to <u>repentance</u>." *Mark 2:17*

Jesus answered and said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. 32 I have not come to <u>call</u> the righteous, but <u>sinners</u>, to <u>repentance</u>." *Luke 5:31-32*

Mark 2:17 The repentant person—the one who recognizes he is a sinner and who turns from his sin—is the object of Jesus' call. The person who is sinful but thinks he is righteous (self-righteous) refuses to acknowledge his need to repent of his sin.

Jesus came to call sinners to repent:

- 1) Stop sinning immediately—stop what you are doing (sinning)
- 2) Turn around and completely go the other way
- 3) Change
- 4) Turn your mind and your heart from sin to Jesus (180° turn)

Luke 5:31 "who are well"—Those who think they are whole, do not seek healing. This is the importance of <u>admitting</u> first that you are sick (admit you are a sinner). You must admit to your problem first before you can change. Then change = Repent from your sin. When you turn to Jesus, you immediately are sinning less and turning away from sin. The explanation is as follows: The greatest sin a person can commit is <u>rejection of the witness of the Holy Spirit</u> about Jesus. The following sin that occurs is the <u>sin of unbelief and rejection of Jesus</u> as the Messiah and the Son of God. By accepting and receiving Jesus as your Lord and Savior, you are immediately turning away and repenting of these two great sins.

People who are sinners who come to Jesus know they are lost in darkness and cry out for spiritual light. They know they are "sick and need healing," i.e., they recognize they are sinners and need a Savior. They know they were once blind and now they see (J 9:39-41, J 9:25). Sin of unbelief is sin #2 because this can always be corrected and repented of by accepting and receiving the testimony of the Holy Spirit. Sin of rejection of the Holy Spirit is sin #1 because this will always → person rejecting Christ → nonforgiveness of sins → Hell.

Jesus began His ministry with a message of repentance:

From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent, for the kingdom is at hand." Matt 4:17

And Jesus ended His ministry with a message of repentance:

Then He said to them, "Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day, and that <u>repentance</u> and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. And you are witnesses of these things." *Luke 24:46-48*

Understand the surest thing in the universe is the existence and truth of Jesus Christ. That He is who He says He is. Scientifically and mathematically the surest fact is the existence and resurrection of Jesus Christ, more sure than any known fact of science. Jesus said, "Because I live, you will live also." (John 14:19). Your resurrection is guaranteed because of Jesus' resurrection. Therefore, you can believe in your resurrection into heaven 100%. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life... whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die." (John 11:25-26). "If you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead you shall be saved." (Romans 10:9). Our salvation is our hope and our promise from God. God cannot lie. God promises us eternal life with Him. Therefore, hold on to it, it is our anchor in life, it is our victory over death. Remember, God is God of the living, not the dead. Our resurrection into heaven is as sure as the resurrection of Jesus Christ Himself.

Correct doctrines in Christianity

The Narrow Way

"Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it.

You Will Know Them by Their Fruits

"Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravenous wolves. You will know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes from thornbushes or figs from thistles? Even so, every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit. A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor *can* a bad tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Therefore by their fruits you will know them.

I Never Knew You

"Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!' *Matt 7:13-23*

Matt 7:13-23

People who practice lawlessness are in rebellion to God and are never saved to begin with. Jesus says here, "I never knew you"—i.e., you were never saved. Notice, these are people who went to church, but yet never had a true relationship with Jesus Christ. Few find the narrow gate to salvation. This means a lot of people in church are not going to heaven.

There are three doctrines held and taught within the church. Two are correct and one is wrong.

Doctrine #1

A true Christian cannot lose their salvation—this is correct and taught everywhere in Scripture. There is eternal security of the believer.

Doctrine #2

There are people who think they are saved, but they are not saved and never were saved. This is correct and Matt 7:13-23 addresses this. There are people within the church who think they are Christians but they are not. They practice sin and lawlessness. They refuse to subject themselves to the Lordship of Christ. They refuse to surrender to Jesus. They live in unrepentant sin and never repent. They do not have Jesus in them. They do not have the Holy Spirit in them. They never change for the better. They never undergo sanctification. You never see fruits of the Holy Spirit. There is no transformation in them and they love their sin more than Jesus. They do not love Jesus, do not love their neighbor and do not forgive their brother; instead, they practice sin and evil. They are workers of iniquity (sin) and are not saved and were never saved (Matt 7:13-23, Luke 13:26-28). They never had a personal relationship with Jesus. Therefore, Jesus does not know them and He never knew them, i.e., they were never saved.

Doctrine #3

Some false teachers teach that a believer can lose their salvation. This is incorrect. There is eternal security of the believer and a true Christian cannot lose their salvation. Basically, people who believe doctrine #3, that a person has lost their salvation, must realize that this person was never saved in the first place and Doctrine #2 is what truly occurred. When a person truly loves Jesus and is in love with Jesus, their faith gets stronger over time, not weaker. If the person "falls away" they were never saved and never had genuine saving faith.

First Love

To begin to try to understand God's love for us and our love for Him, you have to remember your first love. I have only been in love once in my life and I thank Jesus for this because I would have never been able to understand Christianity until this happened to me.

God is love, and he who abides in love abides in God, and God in him. John 4:16

love is the fulfillment of the law. Romans 13:10

Jesus said to him, <u>'You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.</u>' This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: <u>'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.'</u> On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets." *Matthew 22:37-40*

God loves us with "<u>Agape</u>" love, which is the sacrificial infinite love that God has for us through Christ His Son. Both the Father (by sacrificing Jesus) and Jesus by His willingness to be sacrificed, committed acts of amazing agape love for the believer—God's child. What father do you know on earth that would crucify his son to death for you? God the Father did this for us so that we could go to heaven to be with Him and Jesus forever. The purpose of Jesus coming to earth was to redeem man from their sin. Jesus paid the penalty for our sin on the Cross and took our punishment.

For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. *John 3:16-17*

We will never truly grasp how much God loves us. God gave His only Son to be tortured, crucified to death and undergo the most painful form of death. This is because He loves us that much and wants us to be <u>forgiven and redeemed</u> by the blood of Christ to have salvation.

Jesus Himself allowed His own Crucifixion because of His infinite love for us—the believer. It is Jesus' love that nailed Him to the cross—not the Romans or Jews. Jesus is God the Son and He could have jumped off the Cross anytime He wanted, but He did not. His last words on the Cross was, "Tetelestai"—which in Hebrew means, "paid in full" for the debt of the sin of mankind.

To Him [Jesus] who loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood.

Revelation 1:5

And walk in love, as Christ also has loved us and given Himself for us Ephesians 5:2

I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me.

Galatians 2:20

Jesus said to His disciples, "This is My commandment, that you <u>love one another</u> as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends." *John 15:12-13*

Did you know that God the Father loves us, the believer, as much as He loves Jesus?

Jesus prayed to the Father, "that the world may know that You have sent Me, and have loved them as You have loved Me." John 17:23

To me, this is by far the most amazing passage in Scripture. God loves us sinners that much; humans who are at times selfish, inconsiderate and unthankful. By God's grace alone we are saved.

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. *Ephesians 2:8*

<u>Look deeply at a relationship between two people that are in love with each other</u>. When you do this, there are times when you will understand God's love for us and there are times when you will understand how our love should be for God and Jesus.

We as the believer, God's child, must truly be able to say:

"I am in love with you Father."

"I am in love with you Jesus."

"I am in love with you Holy Spirit."

"I am in love with you God. Amen."

Do you <u>remember</u> when you fell in love for the first time? I remember as if it was today. I wanted to see her all the time. Talk to her all the time. Wanted her to call me or text me all the time. I got depressed when she would not call me for a few days. If it went as long as a week, it was the end of the world. I bought her and gave her anything she wanted. I was willing to sacrifice myself for her—that is how much I loved her. I was willing to spend all my money just to help her. There was a time when I even risked freedom to do payback on someone that was tormenting her. But fortunately, Jesus worked it out and prevented it from happening. I promised her I would never leave her, never forget her and never let go of her. And I have still kept that promise.

God promises never to leave us or forsake us.

For He Himself has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." So we may boldly say:

"The LORD is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" *Hebrews 13:5-6*

"No man shall be able to stand before you all the days of your life; as I was with Moses, so I will be with you. I will not leave you nor forsake you." *Joshua 1:5*

I know I will love this girl forever. I still think about her all the time. In the morning when I wake up, mid-day, when I go to bed and in the middle of the night. This is how we are to love God.

But as it is written:

"Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, Nor have entered into the heart of man The things which God has prepared for those who love Him." 1 Cor 2:9

But if anyone loves God, this one is known by Him. 1 Cor 8:3

We love Him because He first loved us. 1 John 4:19

The only person I love more than this girl in the whole world is Jesus Christ. I am in love with her and I am in love with Jesus Christ. I think about Jesus and talk about Jesus <u>all</u> day long and <u>all</u> night long. Ask anybody who knows me and they will tell you this is true. As a physician, I still tell every patient about Jesus and minister to them. I am a preacher first and a doctor second. Jesus first at all times, 24/7/365, not just Sunday morning.

Did you know in Scripture we (the church, the believers) are the virgin bride of Christ?

Then one of the seven angels who had the seven bowls filled with the seven last plagues came to me and talked with me, saying, "Come, I will show you the bride, the Lamb's wife." Revelation 21:9

Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like a certain king who arranged a marriage for his son" *Matthew 22:2*

Jesus said, "Then the kingdom of heaven shall be likened to ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. Now five of them were wise, and five were foolish. Those who were foolish took their lamps and took no oil with them... And while they went to buy, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went in with him to the wedding; and the door was shut."

Matthew 25:1-10

We are married to Christ when we confess Him as Lord and Savior. Being virgin brides, Christ is our <u>first love</u>. Christ in fact warns us in Revelation to never forget our first love for Him.

"Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your <u>first love</u>. Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent and do the first works, or else I will come to you quickly and remove your lampstand from its place—unless you repent." *Revelation 2:4-5*

When we say our confession of faith we are in fact saying, "I do" and "yes" as in a marriage ceremony. For example, "Do you accept and receive Christ as your Lord and Savior as long as you shall live?" And you answer "I do," "yes!" Marriage is a commitment. Our salvation is a commitment to Christ. Our heart chooses Jesus forever.

When I fell in love, I wanted to marry this girl. I could think of no other girl that I want to be with forever. One day I confessed my eternal love to her and said "I love you so much and I need you in my life forever." These are words that we need to say to Jesus Christ. I will never forget that day, just like I will never forget the day I accepted the Lord into my heart. I simply could not get enough of my first love. I needed her love as much as possible. When she or I called each other, I never wanted to get off the phone. This is true with our relationship with Jesus. If we love Him, we will talk to Him, pray to Him and listen to Him.

Many times I tell people about this girl and tell them how much I love her. This is why <u>true Christians</u> are not afraid to tell people: 1) they are Christians, 2) they love Jesus, 3) they are willing to tell other people about Jesus— to witness about the Christ, and 4) they will say "I love the Lord!"

And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

1 Cor 13:13

Jesus in His last statement to His disciples was the Great Commission—He commanded us to tell others about Him.

"Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and Io, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Amen. *Matthew* 28:19-20

Jesus after His resurrection appeared to seven disciples at the seashore and asked Peter three times, "Do you love me?"

Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of Jonah, do you love Me more than these?"

He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know that I love You."

He said to him, "Feed My lambs."

He said to him again a second time, "Simon, son of Jonah, do you love Me?"

He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know that I love You."

He said to him, "Tend My sheep."

He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of Jonah, do you love Me?" Peter was grieved because He said to him the third time, "Do you love Me?"


And he said to Him, "Lord, You know all things; You know that I love You."

Jesus said to him, "Feed My sheep. John 21:15-17

This is one of the best ways to know if someone is a Christian. Ask them "Do you love Jesus?" If they say "Yes" every time, they are a Christian—a follower of the Christ.

I want to be with her forever and absolutely no one else. If she made mistakes, I didn't care. I forgave her and love her unconditionally. If she committed lies, robbery, harsh words with her parents, mistakes with drugs or being selfish in her relationship with others, I did not care. I would still forgive her, receive and accept her and love her.

This is how God loves us. When we receive Jesus as our Lord and Savior, God forgives us of all our sins: past, present and future; no matter how terrible they are. In fact, the Father no longer sees any of our sins when we become His child. All He sees is the blood of Jesus Christ covering us. We are made white and pure as snow. Our sins are as far from Him as east is from west. We are cleansed completely from our sin and all that matters to God is our love for Him and Jesus and His love for us. Forgiveness is an act of love. God forgives us because He loves His children.

"For I will be merciful to their unrighteousness, and their sins and their lawless deeds I will remember no more." *Hebrews 8:12*

the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin. 1 John 1:7

Have mercy upon me, O God,
According to Your lovingkindness;
According to the multitude of Your tender mercies,
Blot out my transgressions.
Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity,
And cleanse me from my sin. Psalms 51:1-2

The LORD is merciful and gracious,
Slow to anger, and abounding in mercy.
He will not always strive with us,
Nor will He keep His anger forever.

We received all our emotions from God. We are made in God's image. I began to understand what God wants in our faith—love relationship with Him and Jesus. He simply wants us to love Him and Jesus—to fall in love with Him and Jesus. All I ever wanted in life was for the girl I was in love with to fall in love with me and to love me. I wanted nothing else and nothing else mattered. But in life, you cannot make someone love you. It is a free will decision of the heart. As much as I loved this girl, I could not make her love me. It had to be a decision of her heart on her own.

I remember when I told her the first time I loved her. I was the most nervous and scared I had ever been in my whole life. I was afraid to tell her and I was afraid she would say nothing back. If that happened, I don't think my "achy breaky heart" could have taken it. I might have just died on the spot. It's weird how the most important thing you have ever done occurs at what seems to be the worst timing to do it. She was having the worst day of her life and out of nowhere I held her and told her, "I love you." And she said "I love you too." This was, is, and will always be, the best moment of my life.

God loves us this way. He just wants you to say to Him, "I love you too."

God is love. I hope God does not get mad at me but I believe God needs love in return, just as we do. He wants us to love Him, praise Him and worship Him forever. The most famous Christian nursery rhyme is "Jesus loves me." I even made a Christian song titled, "Jesus loves me" that is going all over the world. Jesus loves me because the Bible tells me so. The entire Bible is a love letter to us from God telling us how much God and Jesus loves us.

And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose. *Romans 8:28*

There are 3 things God cannot do:

- 1) He cannot learn
- 2) He cannot lie
- 3) He cannot make us love Him

God cannot force us to love Him. When we choose Jesus and receive Jesus into our heart, it is done by our own free will. God does not want robots. He wants children to come to Him, to choose Him and Jesus because they want to and because they love Him. This is why the devil and evil is allowed to exist on earth. If Satan was not on earth, we would pick Jesus to follow only because Jesus would be the only choice. To truly choose Jesus, there must be another choice (the devil, false religions or science as your god, etc.) E.g. If you are on an island that only has one girl, then choosing her is not a choice. You picked her because she was the only one there. If there are two or more girls on the island, then picking that first girl would truly be a choice.

In God's perspective, you choosing Him and Jesus with your own free will is more important than the devil and evil existing on earth for a brief moment in time.

Faith is simply a close love relationship with Jesus and God. In fact, the two words faith and love are interchangeable. Love is the most important dimension of faith. And in Scripture when you put love in place of the word faith, you will understand Scripture more deeply.

By definition, 1) faith is our relationship with Jesus, and 2) we are to love the LORD our God will <u>all</u> our heart, soul, mind and strength.

And you shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' *Mark 12:30*

- 1) Faith = Our relationship with Jesus
- 2) Our relationship with Jesus = Our love for Jesus

therefore, 3) Faith = Our love for Jesus

In any true love relationship both people have to love each other. This is Christianity.

- 1) God loves us forever—This is eternal and never changes.
- 2) We are to love God and Jesus in return for eternity.

When I fell in love, I told the girl I would love her forever and to this day I still love her and I know I will love her forever. True love <u>never</u> dies. True faith <u>never</u> dies. A true Christian will never stop loving Jesus. Christian = person who follows the Christ = person who loves the Christ. A true Christian will always have Genuine Saving Faith and they will change for the better because Jesus is in their heart and God the Holy Spirit lives inside them. In the true believer, you will see a changed person by definition because Jesus is in the man and the power of the Holy Spirit is transforming the person (sanctification). A true Christian cannot lose their salvation because if they truly loved Jesus, they would keep the faith.

When you fall in love with Jesus you change. You become a different person. You are born again. When I fell in love with Jesus, I changed. I was no longer a hater, I loved Jesus and started to love my neighbor. I was able to show mercy and forgive people for their sins against me; when before I was a Christian, I had great difficulty with forgiveness. With Jesus in my heart, I was able to give up some very bad sins that I was doing and at the same time I started doing more good deeds. When I fell in love with the girl, I changed. I wanted to please her. I wanted to be an example for her and be a good person that she would respect and love.

My first love was the only girl I wanted to talk to and see all the time. I would call her "too much," text her "too much" and give her "too much". The #1 sign of true love is the desire to talk to and see each other and give to each other. If there is no desire to communicate, there is no relationship. The same thing applies to prayer (talking to Jesus and God).

I tell you that if a person never prays, never talks to Jesus, never wants to talk to Jesus, and never asks Jesus for help then he is not a Christian. He is not saved. How can you say you love someone but then you never want to talk to them.

I preach the doctrine that the best sign of genuine saving faith is a prayer life. A person that prays to Jesus throughout his life is a person that has a close personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Only God knows the heart of a man but you can see the heart of a man by his actions.


"I will show you my faith by my works" James 2:18


Faith is a love relationship with Jesus Christ.
